FROZEN DESSERT SALAD

MRS. M. L. GANEY, Roseburg, Ore. 1 No. 3 can peach halves 1/2 c. orange juice 2 T. lemon juice Speck salt 2 eggs, separated 1/2 c. granulated sugar 1/2 c. heavy cream, whipped 1/2 c. mayonnaise Lettuce Drain the peaches, reserving the juice. Combine 1/4 cup of the peach juice with the orange and lemon juices and the salt in a double boiler and heat. Then pour slowly over the beaten egg yolks combined with the sugar; cook over hot water until thickened, stirring constantly. Cool, then fold in the whipped cream, mayonnaise, and egg whites, beaten stiff. Arrange the drained peach halves cut side up in the tray of an automatic refrigerator and pour the cream mixture over them. Freeze without stirring until set. Cut into squares, allowing one peach half per serving and arrange on individual heads of lettuce. Serves 6 to 8.
