

Saunders' Ninth-Inning Homer Wins For Eagles

MEDFORD TOWNIES DEFEATED, 6 TO 5

Visitors Looked Like Sure Victors on Miljus' 4-Ply Hit in 1st of Ninth.

Morgan "Sandy" Saunders put a story book ending to Sunday's baseball game here to give the Roseburg Eagles a 6 to 5 victory over Johnny Miljus' Medford Townies.

With Roseburg trailing one run in the last of the ninth, and with two down, Saunders cracked out a long homer, with one on.

Saunders was doubly a hero in the game, having lashed out a single to score the tying run when sent into the game as a pinch hitter in the seventh.

Miljus broke a 4-to-4 tie in the first of the ninth with a left field homer, putting Medford one run in the lead.

In the last of the ninth, Solomon, a pinch hitter, was safe when Erickson, Medford pitcher, failed to touch the bag in a fielding play at first. Erickson threw wild past first in attempting to catch Solomon off the bag, the runner advancing to second. The next two batters were easy outs. Saunders then came through with one of the longest drives to be made on the local diamond this season, putting the ball out of the lot over center field.

Miljus, former Pittsburgh Pirate twirler, now coach, manager and fielder for the Medford Townies, ended a three-run Roseburg rally, which tied the score in the seventh inning, with a one-handed, stalling catch of Taylor's drive, which sifted through the boughs of trees in deep left field.

Sunday's game was one of the best to be seen in Roseburg this season.

Medford Scores First

Medford started off with a three-run drive in the first inning after two were down. The tallies were made on two walks, an error and two wild pitches. "Smoky" Joe Spencer, pitcher, being very wild in the first inning. He settled down in the second, however, and allowed only four scattered hits and whiffed five during the balance of the game.

Roseburg was held scoreless until the fourth, when Martin drove out a sizzling three-bagger, which scored on a Texas leaguer by Baker.

Medford added another in the fifth when Calvert hit for a double after two were down and scored on a single by Lewis.

Baker started Roseburg's seventh inning rally when he cracked out a single into deep right field and stole second. Loffer, always dependable in the pinches, dropped a rest single over second base to push Baker across the plate. Yakei was sent in to hit for Morgan and proved the good judgment of Coach Rudy Ritzman by cracking out a long drive which sent Loffer to third. Saunders was then sent into the game to bat for Shinn, and drove in Loffer and Yakei to tie the score.

Erickson, wobbling badly, was saved from utter rout by Miljus' sensational catch of Taylor's drive.

Neither team threatened in the eighth, but in the first of the ninth Miljus, first man up, took hold of the first pitched ball for a sharp crack over left field, good for four bases, giving Medford a one-run advantage.

With the game apparently in the bag for Medford, Saunders earned the wild plaudits from the excited fans with his sensational flounce to the contest.

The eighth-place Sacramento Solons continued their habit of winning Sunday doubleheaders by clipping the San Francisco Seals, 6-2, 4-1.

Los Angeles' moribund Angels rose against Oakland and achieved another double triumph 9-3, 7-3. As a result, the Missions, Oaks and Padres were tied for third place, 3 1/2 games behind the league leader, while sixth-place Angels, not out of the running for the Shamussey plan play-off, were only eight games down from Portland.

It's the Cubs against the field again in the National league.

They wound up their week-end bombardment yesterday with a 29-hit assault against the Pirates to take both ends of a doubleheader, 10-1 and 9-2, and move back into the first place they gave up last week.

The Cardinals were knocked out of the lead by a tremendous hitting attack on the part of the Cincinnati Reds, who fired 40 safe blows all over the lot to turn in a twin win, 16-2 and 12-5.

With the lead at stake, the Cubs and Cards clash today in the start of their second series in a week. The Chicagoans went down three out of four in the last meeting.

The fast-moving Giants, stretched their winning streak to seven yesterday by downing the Phillies 6-2, with Castelman starring in a three-hit, eight-inning relief pitching trick.

Maintaining their 11-game American league lead, the Yankees bowled over the Athletics twice, 7-4 in ten innings and 3-0, with Gehrig hitting his 24th homer in the opener and driving in all the runs in the nightcap with a triple with the bases loaded.

The Indians saved second place with a doubleheader triumph over the White Sox, 9-1 and 5-2.

Van Atta pitched the Browns to a 4-3 win over the Tigers while the Red Sox took the only victory of their series with the Senators, winning 5-2 as Jimmy Fox belted a double and triple.

The Brooklyn Dodgers climbed out of the National league cellar for the first time in two months with a twin victory over the Bees 4-0 and 5-2.
