Crater Lake National park near  
Union peak and menacing consid-  
erable merchantable timber. The  
loss was nominal.

**LAKE MICHIGAN STORM  
BRINGS LOSS AND BENEFIT**  
CHICAGO, Aug. 10.—A furious  
storm left a trail of extensive  
damage along the Lake Michigan  
shore today but the drenching  
downpour revived late crops in an  
important section of the drought  
belt.

A 60-mile-an-hour wind—accom-  
panied by thunder, lightning and  
blinding rain—swept out of the  
north last night.

Coast guard vessels labored  
through turbulent waters to the  
rescue of 14 sailing ships.  
Damage along the Lake Michigan  
shore today but the drenching  
downpour revived late crops in an  
important section of the drought  
belt.

One drowning was reported at  
Milwaukee, another in the Rock  
river at Sterling, Ill. Wisconsin  
also recorded a lightning death.

Trees were uprooted, poles top-  
pled, communication lines torn  
down and streets littered with  
debris in Chicago. Several build-  
ings were struck by lightning here.  
Ninety fire alarms were turned in.  
Rain—ending 42 days of aridity  
here—fell in northern Illinois,  
northern Indiana and Wisconsin,  
while parts of Minnesota were re-  
freshed by showers.

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—(AP)—  
Democratic leaders of the state as-  
sembled here today to develop  
their campaign strategy.

Claude McCulloch, Klamath  
Falls, state chairman, called mem-

tee together, after which he and  
several party nominees, including  
U. S. Bart, candidate for state  
treasurer; Alfred P. Dodson, can-  
didate for attorney-general, and E.  
W. Kirkpatrick, first district con-  
gressional candidate, will begin a  
tour of western Oregon to confer  
with community leaders. Their  
Roseburg dates are August 13 and  
14.

## REBELS DEFEATED IN MADRID AREA

announced Franco's troops had taken  
position in the hills surround-  
ing Madrid for an assault on the  
community in mopping up opera-  
tions during the march north-  
ward.)

In the far north loyal garrisons  
at San Sebastian, Bilbao, Irun and  
other seaboard cities fought desper-  
ately to prevent rebel access to the  
sea which would permit the im-  
portation of additional arms and  
ammunition.

**Fascists Claim Victory**  
The town and province of San-  
tander on the Bay of Biscay, have  
fallen before the rebels, the in-  
surgent radio station at Tetuan,  
Spanish Morocco, announced.

Fascists claimed a victory at  
Huesca in northeastern Spain in-  
cident to the efforts of Barcelo-  
na loyalists to wipe out rebel op-  
position in that area and eventual-  
ly to capture Zaragoza, the rebel  
stronghold.

A final exodus of all Americans  
whose business did not require  
their presence in Madrid was sched-  
uled for tonight. Between 30 and  
40 Americans, mostly women and  
children, plan to leave for Valen-  
cia to board the United States  
cruiser Quincy.

Only about 100 Americans will  
remain in the capital.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—(AP)—The  
British government today forward-  
ed a protest to Spanish belliger-  
ents in connection with the death  
of a British subject, Captain Ru-  
per Savile, reported slain by insur-  
gent gunfire on a yacht in Gijon  
harbor.

Pending instructions from Lon-  
don, said the message, the British  
government reserved the right "to  
obtain compensation."
