CRANBERRY SALAD

1 qt. cranberries
1 cup water
2 cups sugar
1 pkg. prepared lemon gelatin
2 cups diced celery
1 cup chopped nuts
1 cup chopped apples
1 1/2 cups boiling water
Boil the cranberries in the cup of water for 10 min. Add sugar and allow to boil for 2 min. longer. Dissolve gelatin in the 1 1/2 cups of boiling water. When gelatin has set, but before it is hard, beat in the cranberries, which have been pressed through a colander. Add the celery, nuts and apples and allow to harden. Pour into individual molds or cut in squares and serve on lettuce bed or lettuce leaf. Garnish with mayonnaise. Very good with chicken or turkey.

TOWNSEND VOTE IN
TWO STATES EYED

To the northwest, Republican Chairman John D. M. Hamilton said WPA has called for bids for the preparation of films showing relief projects, declaring the pictures are to be distributed "in the guise of news reels" he said the party is now in forcing the taxpayers, without their consent, to contribute "to a political campaign fund for distribution of propaganda."

While Col. Frank Knox, republican vice-presidential candidate, worked at White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., on coming speeches in his strenuous campaign tour. Secretary Wallace disavowed statements he attributed to Knox.

Wallace said at Chicago that Knox and Chairman Hamilton had charged the new deal with creating a wheat shortage. Accusing them of "setting up a straw man which they have a great deal of fun knocking down." Wallace said the estimated 1936 wheat harvest is about equal to normal consumption, while the July 1 carryover was 150,000,000 bushels.

Labor Views Clash

The labor angle of the campaign was emphasized in parleys in Topeka as well as in Washington.

After a conference with the republican vice-presidential candidate, Munro Roberts, vice-president of the International Typographical union, told newsmen:

"Governor Landon's labor record is satisfactory and when it becomes more generally known it will win him votes in labor circles."

At the labor non-partisan league meeting in Washington, John L. Lewis, united mine workers president, said:

"The republican party has the brazen effrontery to ask the American people to elect a pitiful puppet responsible to Standard Oil, the steel interests, the bankers of New York and Chicago and the Hearst newspapers."

BORAH FACES TOWNSEND
OPPOSITION IN IDAHO

BOISE, Idaho, Aug. 11.—(AP)—Democrats and republicans balloted today in a state primary featuring Senator William E. Borah's opening bid for a sixth consecutive term.

Meanwhile, Townsendites, socialists and farmer-labor-union party delegates met in nominating conventions to name tickets for the November 3, general election.

The state Townsend organization—shaken in recent days by internal controversy over approved lists of candidates—also backed a slate in today's primary. It included Byron Defenbach, former state treasurer, who opposed Borah for the republican senatorial nomination.

Another highspot in the primaries was the race for the democratic nomination between Idaho's three-term governor, C. Ben Ross, and U. S. District Attorney John Carver. Ross faced noisy opposition during the campaign from a faction supporting Carver, with his tax policies coming in for most criticism.

With fair weather general, a big farm vote was forecast. Election officials unofficially estimated 105,000 to 110,000 votes would be cast.
