33 MILLION SPENT ON OREGON RELIEF

WASHINGTON, Aug. 11.—(AP)—A works progress administration report showed today a total of \$33,840,639 was spent in Oregon under the \$48,000,000 relief appropriation act of 1935.

The report covered expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936.

Allocation by the president, embracing disbursements approved by federal authorities, totaled \$16,729,390. Actual obligations incurred, or projects for which funds have been expended or are obligated for expenditure, aggregated \$44,276,635.

The obligations were incurred for purely WPA work relief projects and those carried out by the agriculture, interior, commerce, and treasury departments, the civilian conservation corps, army engineers, resettlement and veterans' administrations, and other agencies.

The \$1,425,000,000 relief appropriation act passed by the 74th congress covers such unexpected balances of the 1935 act "as may be made available by the president," the report said. These funds are to remain available until June 30, 1937, and are to be used at the discretion of the president.

Men and women employed by the Oregon state WPA, exclusive of administrative employees, averaged 23,317 during March, 1936, the report showed. Men workers totaled 18,905, or 84.7 per cent, women, 3,412, or 15.3 per cent.

The average March wage rate was \$36.16. The average for men was \$55.57; women, \$27.74. March earnings averaged \$49.92.

The WPA also listed 13 airport projects approved for Oregon at a total estimated cost of \$233,764.

FISHERS RESCUED, SEA SPARES CARGO

ASTORIA, Ore., Aug. 11.—(AP)—The surging Pacific, after nearly taking the lives of Bartal Martens and his boat pulled when their boat stalled on Peacock spit, returned Martens' boat to him today, along with the 600 pounds of fish aboard.

The boat, which Martens and his companion abandoned, was found by the coastguard off the Washington coast.

The two men jumped into the sea and were rescued by nearby fishermen after efforts to pull Martens' craft from the spit proved fruitless.
