CRANBERRY SALAD
MRS. I. N. SHARPE
Myrtle Creek, Ore.
MRS. CARL J. FISHER
Riddle, Ore.
MRS. REN DAWSON
Jacksonville, Ore.
1 package Orange Jello
1 cup raw ground cranberries
1 cup chopped celery
Pulp of 1 orange
Grated rind of 1/2 an orange
3/4 cup sugar
Dissolve Jello in 2 scant cups boiling water, and let cool while preparing fruit. Add fruit to sugar then add to Jello. When Jello begins to set pour into molds and chill.

STRAWBERRY PRESERVES
MRS. GEORGE SINGLETON, Jr.
Roseburg, Ore.
Better results are obtained if not more than 3 boxes (quart size) are cooked at one time. Wash and stem berries and drain off any superfluous water. Place in a kettle over a low blaze and cook slowly until all

the juice appears to be extracted from the fruit. Skim out the berries, which will appear pale soft and collapsed. To 1 cupful of juice add 3 cupfuls of sugar. Cook until the mixture is thickened and jelly-like. Add the berries and boil 3 minutes. Pour out into shallow pans and allow the mixture to become cold before canning. The berries will retain their original plumpness and color and resemble sunshine preserves. Place in jars or glasses and seal or cover with paraffin.
