OREGON BARLEY MAY BE REFINED

A barley shortage similar to that which occurred in 1934 is in prospect again this year, judging by the most recent federal reports on the prospective barley crop.

Three kinds of barley grown in this state most suitable for that purpose are Hauncheon, Atlas and Wisconsin No. 38, says Dr. D. D. Hill, associate professor of farm crops at Oregon State college.

Growers of these varieties who are planning to hold their barley for this possible outlet will probably make money by getting in touch with their county agent as to best methods of threshing and handling barley for malting purposes.

The eggs brought as high as 29 cents each.

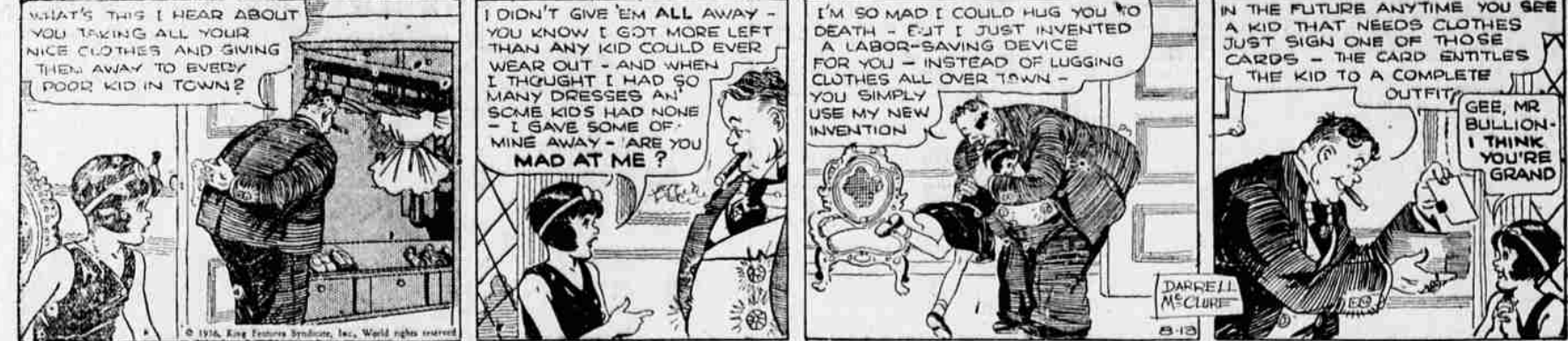
