**HILLSBORO, Aug. 14.**—(AP)—A convention for nomination of independent candidates for president, vice-president, and other national and state officials will be held here Wednesday, August 26. State Senator Peter Zimmerman of Yamhill county, who has been a supporter of Representative William Lemke, is included among the backers.

Under the Oregon law, candidates may have their names placed on the ballot as independents if nominated by an assembly of not less than 250 registered voters. Norman Thomas was recently nominated for president by such an assembly at Salem.

## BANKING DYNASTY OUSTED BY FRANCE

**PARIS, Aug. 13.**—(AP)—The century-old board of regents of the Bank of France, abolished because the government charged it represented an oligarchy dominating French fiscal affairs, will surrender its power tomorrow to a new, government-controlled council. The government will appoint most of the 20 council members directly. It is expected, however, to continue the anti-devaluationist policy of the retiring board of the institution which, since the time of Napoleon, has issued the nation's currency and has been the repository for its gold reserves. The measure fulfilled a campaign promise of Premier Leon Blum, head of the popular front government, to eliminate the so-called "200 families" who it charges controlled the bank. Under the bank's expiring 136-year-old control, drawn up by Napoleon, the board of regents has been elected since 1800 by the 200 largest stockholders. Because the regents—and the shareholders who elected them—often were directors in other corporations, banks and insurance companies, the leftists charged they regarded dividends above the national welfare.
