

PIN BALL OUSTER BLOCKED BY COURT

SALEM, Aug. 14. (AP)—Special Prosecutor Ralph Moody's drive to clear Marion county of all pin-ball machines, pin-ball games and theater bank night met with a temporary setback today when Circuit Judge L. H. McMahon issued a restraining order against molestation until September 17, when arguments will be heard.

The orders against removal of the devices by Sheriff A. C. Burk or arrest of the operators, were issued upon petitions of J. H. Campbell, Gervais, camp operator, and M. J. Arnold, president of the Arnold Amusement company of Salem, both of whom operate pin-ball machines in various parts of the county.

The complaints in the two cases were similar and alleged that placing these devices was not a lottery but a game of skill. Arnold valued his machines at approximately \$2,000, while Campbell fixed the cost of his equipment at \$3,150.

Applications for restraining orders followed the recent announcement by Moody that all alleged pin-ball devices in Marion county be eliminated within a five day period. The deadline expired at midnight yesterday.

NEW DEAL TO GET 'GONG' THIS YEAR, KNOX ASSERTS

HUNTINGTON, W. Va., Aug. 14. (AP)—An attack on the new deal as "the most expensive amateur hour in history" by Frank Knox, vice presidential candidate, who also advocated a "real share the wealth movement" of widespread employee ownership of stock, opened a drive by republicans to recapture West Virginia.

The nominee, speaking before his party's state convention and an overflow crowd of several thousand persons, added:

"And in November, the American people will give all those new deal performers the gong."

Knox declared there had been a strong movement in the direction of wider stock distribution among workers, but that this had been halted "only temporarily" by the depression.

He also amplified his party's position on labor matters, saying: "The relentless forces in the American system are moving toward shorter hours and higher wages. Our republican administration will encourage this trend."

Knox made a definite bid for democratic support, telling the convention the "mad course of the Roosevelt administration" had alienated many leading democrats and that the November battle was "not a campaign against the democratic party."

The unprecedented German sweep continued by the Teuton representatives in competition for pair-oared shells with coxswain which distanced five rivals with a powerful finish.

The Germans, Bustmann and Adamski, with Arend as coxswain, took the lead from Italy nearing 1,000 meters and then won by themselves while the redoubtable crew of 25,000, including Chancellor Hitler, joined in a terrific

The Dutch foursome led Germany and the United States to the finishing line in that order.

With Kiefer setting the pace, the United States made a strong showing in the donat-stroke final. Al Vande Weyhe, of Patterson, N. J., listed world record holder at 1:07.4, was second, followed by Masaji Kiyokawa of Japan with Taylor Brysdale of Detroit fourth.

The United States won the first Olympic basketball championship today, defeating Canada 19 to 8. The Americans led 15 to 4 at half time.

American Legion auxiliary was reported by Gladys O. Turnbull, department president.

After expressing appreciation of assistance given by unit presidents and other department officers, as well as individual units of the state, Mrs. Turnbull declared that the year has been characterized by "growing successes."

"Our enlarged membership has given us greater power to accomplish this year, but it has not been the only numerical strength along which has made possible the success of the year," Mrs. Turnbull said. "Coupled with the increase in numbers there has also been an increase in devotion and loyalty to the Auxiliary cause among our members."

Ninety-two units in Oregon, she reported, have, during the past year, spent \$2,642.18 in providing clothing, food and medical care for families of disabled veterans, in addition to 21,000 for Christmas cheer and \$1,062.21 for hospital

work.

In child welfare the auxiliary co-operating with the 49 and 8 gave financial relief to 1,843 children at an approximate cost of \$7,736.69.

Christmas gifts were provided for all hospitalized veterans in facilities in Oregon, and for Oregon men in the W. B. Walla facility, in addition to maintaining visiting groups and providing entertainment and recreation in the facilities.

A total of 118,200 poppies were made by the veterans in the Roseburg and Portland hospitals, she said, and the sum of \$1,191.58 was paid patients for the memorial flowers.

Among community service activities she listed sponsorship of a public library at Kerty, cash donations of \$418.55 to libraries in addition to donations of 2,217 books exclusive of books and magazines furnished CCC camps; reforestation sponsored by Rose City unit of Portland, and tree plantings by the Grants Pass unit. Oregon units contributed \$2,500 to the American Red Cross emergency funds, the report stated.

Oregon Dept. Grows

Carl Moser, state adjutant, stressed the results of recommendations from the 1935 state convention, pointing out that of 51 resolutions sponsored by the Oregon department at the national convention in St. Louis, following the Oregon meeting at The Dalles, 49 were adopted in full or in part.

"The Oregon department, he reported, has a total bill of \$2,000,000, a gain of nearly 200,000. Fifty-two posts exceeded 100% quota.

He reviewed briefly the statistical work of the state headquarters and expressed appreciation to affiliated groups and other veterans' organizations for cooperation. FIVE MINERS DIE TRYING TO SAVE 6th

MOUNTAIN CITY, Nev., Aug. 14. (AP)—The bodies of six men—five of whom a company official said died "heroically but needlessly"—were recovered today from the gas-filled depths of a copper mine in which they perished last night.

At Salt Lake City, James O. Elton, president of the International Smelting company which operates the mine, said five of the six braved the lethal fumes in an effort to rescue a pumpman who had failed to return early last night from the 500-foot level.

In their haste, he said, they neglected to obtain gas helmets available at the mine plant.

unification.

"It has been the general consensus of opinion," Commander Koehn said, "that this has been the most successful year we have had thus far in Legion history. The payment of the adjusted service certificates, the increase in our national defense forces—both major parts of our program—have materialized. Although it does not meet with what we have been seeking, there has been a liberalization of the widows and orphans act and real progress has been made regarding our universal service measure. There has also been considerable additional beneficial legislation too numerous to mention. We can, however, feel satisfied with the legislation enacted through the efforts of our national organization."

The state commander called attention to the need of a full time service officer and asked the convention to find means of financing such a department with an estimated annual budget of \$2,000.

Wants Training Kept Up

"I now wish to refer to another purely Oregon matter," he said. "I refer to the initiative measure referred to the people—to abolish compulsory military training in our state educational institutions at Eugene and Corvallis. The Legion, I believe, is unalterably opposed to such abolition, inasmuch as it is an attempt to weaken the armed forces of the United States. Said military training has been of inestimable value in building up and maintaining the Reserve Officers Training Corps peace-time soldiers, capable of active, intelligent leadership in any case of emergency. I urge that a committee of 1,000 be immediately formed from among our 100 posts to actively combat the efforts to change the status quo. I warn you that there is a most serious threat and that it would be a great deal of work, if the initiative bill is to be defeated."

Recommendations of the department commander proposed a permanent business committee, permanent committee on trophies and awards a speakers' bureau, and a change in the system of electing delegates to the national convention to conform to Legion district lines instead of congressional districts.

Activity Suggestions

The 21-point program outlined by Commander Koehn for suggested American Legion activity is summarized as follows:

An uncompromising fight against communism, fascism, racism, militarism or any other form of dictatorship and against all subversive activities which tend to incite or violence to overthrow our present form of government.

That a program for adequate na-

tional defense be continued.

Endorsement of world peace based upon any reasonable plan that will not involve the United States in foreign entanglements and weaken national security.

Oppose entry of the United States into the league of nations as now constituted.

Adoption of a permanent strict neutrality policy.

Refusal of future loans to all nations that have defaulted on previous obligations.

Passage by congress of a universal draft law to the end that capital, labor and industry as well as the man power of the country be placed upon the basis of equality in the event of war.

Federal control of armaments and munitions.

Restriction of all immigration for 10 years and registration of all aliens now within the country.

Deportation of alien criminals and expulsion of those advocating overthrow of the government by force or violence.

An increased Mexican border patrol to prevent smuggling.

Withdrawal of diplomatic recognition of Soviet Russia.

Opposition to constitutional amendments tending to interfere with the operation of the fundamental principles of government.

That Armistice day be made a national legal holiday.

Opposition to the modification or cancellation of foreign war debts.

Legislation to prohibit importation of American flags manufactured in foreign countries.

Extension of teaching of Americanism into homes, schools, churches and patriotic and civic societies.

That all employees of federal, state and municipal government be requested to subscribe to an oath of allegiance to the United States.

That the Legion continue a fight for the widows and orphans bill to give the same treatment accorded widows and orphans of veterans of other wars.

That work be continued to secure benefits for disabled veterans.

That the Legion continue a program of community service and child welfare.
