

Gibson's Capture Junior Series Opener, 11 to 5

BINGLES AND WALKS IN FIFTH DECIDE

El Rey Ties Score 4-All in Fourth Inning, Then Go Down to Defeat.

By a score of 11 to 5, the Seattle Gibsons, Washington's Legion Junior champions, defeated the Oregon titlist, Portland's El Rey team, in the first of the three game series for the regional junior baseball crown and the right to play in the western finals at Hamarek, North Dakota.

After Seattle took the lead 4 to 2 in a first inning, in which both teams had the "getters," Portland tied the score in the fourth, only to have the game go glimmering in the fifth as a result of a fresh home run. The El Rey Roosters tried gamely to pull out, but succeeded in adding only one more tally, a counter scored in the eighth, while Seattle added one each in the sixth and seventh.

Seattle batting first in the opening inning, put Morris on base with a single, but he was out at second as Stephens grounded to second, the latter taking first on a fielder's choice. Yorio was hit by a pitched ball and Soriano singled, scoring Stephens. Hutchinson, Seattle's new hitter, was purposely walked, filling the bases and two runs came in on Brandt's single, but Brandt was out trying to stretch the hit to a double.

Davis singled in Portland's half of the inning, and Kirsch once a walk, both scoring when Copeland, Seattle catcher, overthrew second base trying to stop a steal.

With the score standing 4 to 2 in the last of the fourth, Portland tied the score when R. Richards singled and scored when Clifford's single got away from Morris in center field. Clifford scored after Nass' catch of Davis' fly to first.

Game Won in Fifth

Seattle, however, put the game on ice in the fifth. Morris led off with a double and Stephens walked. Soriano drove Morris to with a single, and Hutchinson was again purposely walked. Endress came to bat and cleared the path along the third base line by bunting. In the left field, Kirsch made a desperate try for the ball, but it bounced out of his glove and rolled into the tennis court adjoining the field. The umpires at first ordered Endress back to second, contending that ground rules limited him to two bases, but after a vigorous argument, he was awarded the home run.

Hits by Morris and Stephens and a fielder's choice scored Morris for Seattle in the sixth, and Hutchinson singled and scored in the seventh on a single by Nass and a double by Copeland.

In the last of the eighth Clifford singled for Portland, stole second, and scored on Kellenberger's line drive over third base.

This traveling team is a young group, many of the players being said to be products of American Legion baseball. The players are white, and wear gaudy, striped uniforms that suggest the penitentiary.
