MORE OREGON FISH EGGS FOR FINLAND

PORTLAND, Aug. 13.—(AP)—The fourth shipment of the eggs of the famous Columbia river chinook salmon in as many years soon will be spending toward Finland, where an attempt is being made to turn the American fish into a Finnish industry.

In 1933, the Finns imported the first of the chinook eggs and in another year the country expects to learn whether it is possible to transplant the chinook, which ranks as the world's premier salmon. Transporting the eggs from the state's McKenzie hatchery is a delicate task supervised by Hugh C. Mitchell, state director of hatcheries. About 150,000 eggs must reach Finland after they have passed a certain stage of development here and before winter invades Europe.

Especially prepared, insulated cases, cooled by ice to a steady temperature of 34 degrees during the 14-day ocean journey are needed for the transfer. Answering the question of whether Oregon is fostering a rival industry in a foreign country, Mitchell answers: "The 150,000 eggs shipped annually are only a small fraction of the Oregon take. At the McKenzie hatchery alone, we took 25,117,000 chinook eggs last year. This experiment cannot establish an industry. It will merely demonstrate whether the chinook can live in Finnish waters."

PINEAPPLE-CHEESE SALAD

Roseburg, Ore.

1/2 cup soft cream cheese

1/2 cup mayonnaise or salad dressing

1/2 cup marshmallows

1/2 cup crushed pineapple

1 cup whipping cream

1/2 teaspoon salt

Cream the cheese, add salad dressing, diced marshmallows and well drained pineapple. Beat the cream very stiff and fold in lightly into the first mixture. Place in mold or refrigerator pan lined with oiled paper and let stand several hours. Serve on lettuce leaves with an additional garnish of salad dressing if desired. Serves 10 or 12.

1 quart sugar

1/2 cup boiling water

Take 1 pint sugar and boiling water, put in large kettle, boil until hard, almost caramelized, add berries, cover with other pint of remaining dry sugar. Boil hard for 12 or 15 minutes. Leave in kettle to get cold. Do not stir at any time. Put in jar and cover.

TO BE BROADCAST

13 Weeks' Schedule Set at KRNR by City's Leading Business Men.

The "Oakland Community Boosters" program will be presented three times weekly, and will include broadcasts by talented Oakland residents, of which there are many. Each program will last half an hour, and will feature publicity concerning the business and agricultural activities of the community in and around the city of Oakland.

The major purposes of these broadcasts is to inform listeners in Douglas county, and at more remote points, of the fact that Oakland is a live, progressive business center, serving a prosperous and industrious farm population. Speakers will be presented from time to time to discuss publicly the problems and projects in which Oakland district people are or should be interested.

UNSKILLED LABOR

FLOCKS TO OREGON

CORVALLIS, Aug. 15.—(AP)—Twenty-one per cent of the heads of families on rural relief who migrated to a cross-section of the state in recent years were totally unskilled labor, research of the agricultural experiment station of Oregon State college, with the aid of the FERA and WPA, disclosed today.

The study of the agricultural phase of Oregon's relief program showed that a fifth of the families on what the federal government classifies as rural relief came to Oregon since 1930 but only 15 per cent of them were experienced in agriculture. Sixty-four per cent were trained to other trades and 21 per cent had no trade training.

The data was accumulated in six counties—Baker, Clatsop, Crook, Josephine, Polk and Morrow—and disclosed these interesting facts:

The average size of the migrating families was a fraction under four persons.

Fifty per cent settled in the open country, 34 per cent in villages and 16 per cent in cities.

COQUILLE STRIKE SETTLEMENT MADE

COQUILLE, Ore., Aug. 15.—(AP)—A strike which deadlocked labor and employers since July 28 ended today when pickets ceased their patrol of the Smith Woods Products company mill.

The Sawmill and Timberworkers union, local 2770, voted last night, 138 to 30, in favor of an agreement worked out in negotiations between union leaders and company representatives, giving women a small increase in wages and bringing the general scale up to that paid in other coast cedar and fir mills.

Monday, 400 men and women will resume their shifts at the plant, restoring a \$12,000-a-week payroll to the city, George Ellett, vice-president of the company, in announcing the agreement, said the company will speed construction of a new fir and plywood mill to be in operation this fall.
