VILLAGE ELECTION ON NAME BLOCKED

EUGENE, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The suggestion of the state highway commission that citizens of a village 20 miles northwest of here vote to determine whether the village is to be called Smithfield or Franklin was vetoed by County Judge Fred Fisk. He held there is no statute covering such an election.

The controversy arose when the highway commission placed signs at the village some time ago reading "Smithfield," the original name. Objections immediately arose on the grounds that Franklin, the name of the postoffice which formerly existed there, was the correct title, but descendants of the pioneer Smith family held out for the other name.

Whip 3 eggs with teaspoon mustard. The juice of one lemon, pinch of salt, cook over hot water, stirring constantly. Cool. Dice one gallon can of pineapple, pit one gallon can of Royal Anne cherries, cut in small pieces one pound marshmallows, Blanch and shred one lb. of almonds. Drain. Whip one quart of cream and fold into fruit. Add cooked dressing. Let stand several hours or over night. Serves 20 people.

CHEESE AND FRUIT SALAD

1/2 cup chopped dates
1/2 cup crushed pineapple
1 pkg. (3 oz.) cream cheese
2 teaspoons lemon juice
1/2 cup mayonnaise
1/2 cup whipping cream

Mash cheese, add mayonnaise, blend until smooth and soft. Fold into whipped cream. Add fruit and mix lightly but thoroughly. Freeze in an electric refrigerator tray. Serve on crisp lettuce. Serves six.

BANK NIGHT TABOO FACES COURT TEST

SALEM, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Suit will probably be filed in circuit court here late today to prevent Sheriff A. C. Burk from closing theatre bank night operations in Marion county.

A complaint was prepared in San Francisco and brought here today by J. W. Ehrlich, San Francisco, and L. R. Boch, Denver, attorneys for the bank night operators. The lawyers left for Ocean Lake on the coast to confer with Ralph E. Moody, special gambling prosecutor for the county.

The theatre owners took action after Moody issued an order directing the sheriff to eliminate all marble boards, pin ball games and bank nights. A temporary restraining order left the games free to operate until a hearing could be held in September.

Moody later countermanded his order closing the bank nights until the expected suit could be filed. The complaint will hold that the bank nights do not constitute a lottery.

AUTO PLANT MODEL TO BE SHOWN HERE

A \$29,000 working model of the world's most modern auto plant will be brought to Roseburg for a one-day special display. It was announced here today by the Plymouth dealers in this territory, Motor Show Garage, Chrysler dealer, and "Sis" Dillard Motor Co., Dodge dealer.

Arrangements have been completed with Plymouth officials in Detroit to send here the company's big mechanical model of its main production plant, so that hundreds of local residents may see in miniature the latest methods of construction employed at the world's most modern automobile factory.

The display is mounted in a special trailer more than 25 feet long, with self-contained equipment for operating the miniature factory.

The exhibit is scheduled to arrive here on August 21, and will be placed on display immediately. Exact location of display will be announced later.

Factory experts will accompany the unit and deliver explanatory lectures during each demonstration. Special motion picture features will be shown in connection with the display.

The miniature plant is an exact scale replica of the giant Plymouth main plant, and is said to be one of the most elaborate mechanical models ever constructed. An intricate system of electric motors shows the factory running at full blast, with tiny figures of workmen going through the motions of regular production on the assembly lines. Cars "produced" in the plant are two and one-half inches long.
