PORTLAND, Aug. 15.—(AP)—America is building toward a pagan nation in the opinion of Bishop Frederick B. Bartlett, head of the department of domestic missions of the Episcopal church.

Visiting here, the bishop said in an interview, that 12,000,000 children of the department of domestic missions of the Episcopal church.

Churches need to center more attention on rural work and among the negroes. Ministers would have more success in building up their denominations if they served the people "the other six days of the week besides Sunday." "When you are invisible six days in the week, you are inconspicuous on the seventh," he remarked. "People do not want the 'hell-fire and fear type of religion' and an 'educational approach' too often lacks any evangelistic fervor, he added. The solution is the invasion of the home by the minister, he added.
