

Gibson's Win Regional Baseball Title

EL REY DEFEATED IN FINALE, 9 TO 3

12 Hits, Including Brace of
Homers, Decide Legion
Series of 3 Games.

Lashing out 12 hits, two being home runs, while others were for extra bases, the Seattle Gibson's defeated El Rey of Portland, 9 to 3, here Saturday to win the regional Legion Junior baseball title and the right to play in the western finals at Bismarck, North Dakota.

Erickson, Portland twirler, started out strong in the first two innings, but wavered in the third, when two hits and an error accounted for three runs. He was relieved by Fenter, southpaw, who was still tired from having pitched Portland to victory Friday, but who held the Gibson's to seven hits and two runs during the balance of the game. The two runs came in the seventh when Hutchinson clouted out a homer with one on.

Portland scored one each in the second, fifth and ninth innings.

The game was marked by sensational fielding, Portland making three double plays and Seattle two. Hutchinson, who pitched Seattle to a win in the first game, limited El Rey to seven hits in Saturday's game and allowed no more than two in any inning.

That Giant express which has been highballing along for a month at the fastest pace of the season is back in second place in the National league today, with only the gas house gang on the track in front.

Climaxing a month-long drive which saw them hammer out 25 victories in 31 starts, Bill Terry's gang took advantage of a letdown on the part of the Cub pitching staff to become the Cardinals' number one challenger.

The rise of the Giants was accomplished by a 6-3 victory over the Phillies and the fall of the Cubs in a double defeat by the Cincinnati Reds, 4-3 and 5-4.

Lois Gehrig hit his 37th and 38th homers as the Yankees split with the Athletics, winning 10-2 and losing 2-1.

OLYMPIAD LEAVES GERMANS IN DAZE

Fanaticism of Attendance
Offers Heavy Task to
Nazi Government.

BERLIN, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The eleventh Olympics ended, the flame blazing day and night in the big stadium doused, there remained to-day only the problem of getting a few hundred thousand pageantry shocked Germans to return to their homes and places of business.

It's going to be a job, but authorities were confident the majority of them would submit to removal quietly. Special treatment probably will have to be accorded the more violent cases—those who have sat in the stadium so long they can remember no other home.

The world has not seen—nor likely to see again until 1940 at Tokyo—anything approaching the fanatical attendance at the Nazi Olympics.

In the dazed minds of American observers it always will overshadow even the smashing victories their lads hung up in track and field, swimming and eight-oared rowing.

The record-amazing nature of the attendance was shown in the figures which revealed an aggregate of 4,500,000 tickets sold to all. Gate receipts totalled 7,500,000 marks, about \$3,000,000.

Total operating costs incurred by the German organizing committee were placed at \$8,500,000. This was entirely apart from the cost of the building of the elaborate Olympic plant, about \$20,000,000.

More than 1,000,000 persons visited Berlin during the two weeks of the games, about 150,000 of them foreigners.

Despite the absence of any official method of determining the all-around Olympic championship nation, Germany would lay claim to the unofficial title. The Germans outscored the United States and everybody else under any system of scoring.

LEADERS OF COAST LOOP HOLD GROUND

NAVY APPOINTMENT OPENED IN OREGON

LOUIS, SHARKEY TO BATTLE TOMORROW

Negro's Future Career in
Ring at Stake; Ex-Gob
Sure He'll Win.

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—A ring-wise veteran who has held the highest boxing title, Jack Sharkey, and a 21-year-old youth who almost made the top of the heap in one jump but failed to land, Joe Louis, meet along the comeback trail tomorrow night.

It's an unusual situation that finds Louis striving to come back at an age when most boxers scarcely would be started, but nevertheless the Brown Bomber's ring career will be at stake when he takes on the 35-year-old ex-gob in a ten-round bout. If Joe can win decisively it will show his knock-out by Max Schmeling was just a bad break, proving perhaps that the Detroit negro was brought along a little too rapidly.

If he can't he'll probably be tabbed a "flash in the pan" and dropped rudely from the list of heavyweight contenders.

Sharkey has to contend with a lot of entirely different angles, beginning with the fact that he's 33 years old, if not more.

He is coming back, not because he needs the money but because he loves action, he says. Besides, he's sure he can lick Louis and, like Schmeling, he is eager to be the first man ever to win the heavyweight title twice.

Comeback Not Bright

Reports along the border said firing squads began executions soon after the bombardment started.

Dispatches from Bilbao said the rebel destroyer Velasco shelled Fort Santurce starting fires there but causing no casualties.

The bombardment apparently was intended chiefly to demoralize the government defenders.

At Saint Jean De Luz, France, German sailors reported that 500 prisoners held as hostages by leftist government forces at Bilbao were burned alive when rebel shells set fire to their warehouse-prison.

No Quarter Shown

One of the bloodiest battles of Spain's month-old civil war was fought meaningfully in the ancient western province of Extremadura, with 20,000 government troops and militia trying to break a rebel blockade along the Portuguese frontier.

The government reported fierce fighting with bayonets, with no quarter shown on either side.

Reports that rebels, in taking government adherents spurred the government forces into a merciless drive to "completely exterminate" the rebels in the west, authorities at Madrid said.

Messages from Captain Bayo, chief of the government forces landing at Palma, Mallorca, said his men were in possession of the entire coast as far as Punta Amer.

(Reports reaching London stated rebels had trapped the Mallorca landing party, killing 500 and taking 250 prisoners.)

In Madrid, two ringleaders of the capital's unsuccessful military revolt, General Isaura, Puchol and Colonel Jose Fernandez de Quintana, died before a firing squad, convicted by a court-martial of military rebellion.

Earlier, Spanish government troops seized fascist rebels barricaded in the Gijon jail after bitter fighting and began the "victory march" across the Isle of Mallorca.

Many were killed, loyalists reported, in the battle to oust the Gijon rebels who fired through barred windows of the jail and from the army engineers' barracks until forced to surrender.

The shelling of Gadalajara subsided early in the afternoon, after a two-and-a-half-hour assault, and two persons who were wounded when a bomb fell on a farm at Fuentenrriba were the only known casualties.

Government leaders, encouraged by what they said was the failure of the rebels to attack by land, indicated they were ready for an early counter-offensive.

Church Wealth Seized

Harried by communist clamor for a "baby Russia," the Madrid government seized millions of dollars from church repositories.

Authorities said more than 200,000,000 pesetas, (nominally \$25, 200,000) in currency, gold, jewels and negotiable securities were taken from a bank vault of the Sisters of St. Vincent de Paul.

A total of 500,000 pesetas in negotiable wealth was taken from nuns and priests attempting to flee the country, the government said.

Growing communist unrest was apparent, reliable sources indicated, "Direct, brutal, violent" action to stop the revolt was demanded by disaffected anarchists.

Socialist and anarchist food committees, armed with improvised "paper money," were given the task of feeding an estimated 100,000 militiamen and their families.

MADRID, Unrecovered Dispatch by Air to Hendaye, France, Aug. 17.—Disloyalty of its aviators has become a main obstacle to the Spanish government seeking to crush the fascist rebellion.

Harrassed by growing communist cries of "Brutal, violent" action in the civil war, the government dare not send its air armada into the fight, authoritative sources here asserted, for fear the aviators will desert.

Early in the revolt many pilots sent into battle joined the insurgents, these sources said.

Were it not for this lack of confidence, military tacticians point out, whole squadrons of war planes could be thrown against enemy strongholds to speed an end to the revolt.

WITH REBEL FORCES AT BURGOS, SPAIN, Aug. 17—

Smashing rebel victories on both the Madrid and Zaragoza fronts were announced today by fascist army officials.

Rebel advisers said Madrid government troops projected a violent counter-attack against rebels besieging the capital, but the government forces were beaten back after a hard day of fighting.

The opposing columns met at Alcala, northeast of Madrid, and rebels asserted they drove the Madrid troops back toward Guadalajara.

Rebels claimed "an important victory" in a battle with government troops near Zaragoza. More than 600 government soldiers were reported killed and 150 prisoners taken.
