FRUIT SALAD MRS. L. B. OTTERBURG

1 small can seedless grapes, 1 banana, sliced, 1 orange, peeled and sliced, 2 slices pineapple, sliced, 1 cup whipped cream, 1 cup mayonnaise. Mix; serve on crisp lettuce leaves. Garnish with candied cherries.

FRUIT SALAD DESSERT MRS. HARRY A. SINGLE

1 lb. marshmallows; 3 grapefruit; 2 oranges; 2 oz. maraschino or candied cherries; 1/2 c. blanched almonds or walnuts; 1/2 c. sliced pineapple. Cut up marshmallows in quarters. Separate grapefruit and oranges, shred cherries and nuts. Mix ingredients lightly but thoroughly and pack into a glass or porcelain mold. Allow to remain over night in the refrigerator. Slice and serve on lettuce covered plates topped with fruit salad dressing.

ZANE GREY LANDS GIANT DEVIL RAY

Zane Grey, novelist and big-game fisherman, has just broken another record by landing with rod and line a giant devil ray, off the Queensland coast, which weighed more than 1200 pounds.

It measured 12 feet across the back and was 10 feet, 6 inches long, he reported. It is one of the few giant rays ever caught with rod and line, and was landed only after a terrific struggle of nearly four hours.

The devil ray is a giant species of the stingray or "stingaree" and has been known to exceed 20 feet in width and half a ton in weight.

Grey recently broke the world's record by landing an enormous shark with rod and line off the New South Wales coast—Australian Press Bureau.
