MARKETS

PRODUCE

PORTLAND, Aug. 18.—(AP)—A cut of one-half cent a pound in the price on cucumbers on the produce exchange for the late season forced down all prices except extras, which were quoted here today at the highest general spread in the history of the trade.

The fight between various conflicting interests results from the unnatural condition of the market, rather than supply and demand within the local territory, observers said. On the open market sales are not made on the basis of the exchange values as a rule and prices are likewise not following the lead of the organization list.

There was no change in the buying price on butterfat for the day.

B GRADE CREAM FOR MARKET—Buying price, butterfat basis, 53¢ lb.

EGGS—Buying price by wholesalers: Extras, 24¢; standards, 21¢; extra medium, 20¢; do medium, 19¢; 18¢; undergrade, 16¢; pullets, 14¢ dozen.

CANTALOUPE—The bulles, 85¢ to \$1 crate; Yakima standards, 75-85¢ crate.

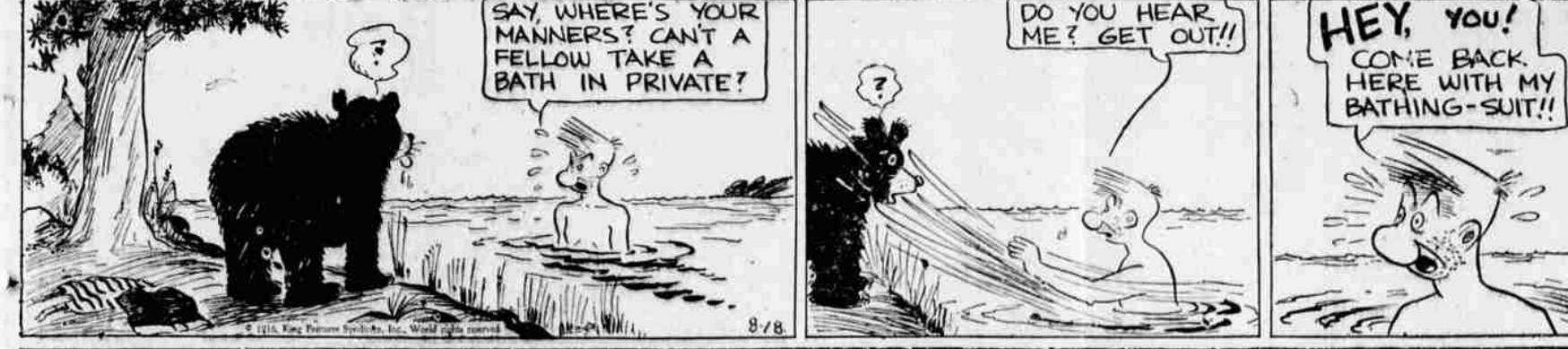
