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CALIFORNIA SHIPS MENAGED BY GALE

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18. — (AP) — A terrific gale howled off the lower California coast today, disabling three fishing boats and imperiling the crews.

The fate of the Enterprise, grounded off Tosco Point, south of Magdalena bay, was unknown after a distress call at 3:10 a. m., said: "Afrail can't stay with it much longer."

A second vessel, the Magellan, also reported itself in distress in wireless messages picked up here by the Mackay radio, but the Cipango succeeded in towing her off shoals.

A third ship, the tuna boat Panama, reported it had piled up on the sand at the north end of Magdalena bay, about 700 miles south of San Pedro.

The Enterprise wireless had not been heard again but the Magellan described the storm raging along the coast.

"Very bad weather yet, high seas and blowing gale."

The Standard oil tanker D. G. Scofield was racing to aid the Enterprise.

The coast guard cutter Calypso also left San Diego for rescue work.

Mackay officials believed 16 or 18 men were aboard the Enterprise and from 10 to 15 on the Magellan.

NATIVE TOWN GETS READY FOR LANDON

WEST MIDDLESEX, Pa., Aug. 18. — (AP) — Governor Alf M. Landon would scarcely recognize his native town today with its usually placid, tree-bordered streets alive with cars, its flag-stap railroad depot suddenly turned into a big town station and his old home glistening white with a new coat of paint.

Preparing to welcome the republican presidential candidate next Saturday and a crowd which leaders predict will exceed 100,000, the town of 1,189 inhabitants appeared a bit topsy-turvy.

Citizens and workers hustled about in shirt sleeves, uniformed police stood around with blueprints, studying traffic problems, and sightseers got in everybody else's way. G. R. Christley, the crossing watchman, declared he

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hadn't seen so much excitement in all the 25 years he has had the job.

Railroads laid additional side tracks in preparation for the expected two acre special trains. A baggage and ticket office and other buildings are under construction nearby.

Gov. Landon left here while a baby but returned for many boyhood summer vacations.

ICKES DENOUNCES HIS SON'S ARREST

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17. — (AP) — Hitting again at the arrest in Massachusetts of his adopted son, Robert H. Ickes, on a charge of operating an automobile while under the influence of liquor, Secretary Ickes said today "We'll meet the charges in court."

The interior secretary declined to comment directly on the denial by Police Sergeant Charles J. Harzold of his (Ickes) assertion that the arrest at Winchester, Mass., last week was for "unfair political reasons," but dictated the following statement to reporters:

"I don't mind the give and take of a man's fight, and if any one for any reason wants to attack me directly, that's one thing.

"But to attack me over a young lad who is an innocent bystander and just trying to make a start in life — and do it in such a way as to handicap him — I think that is pretty contemptible.

"A lawyer has been retained, and we'll meet the charges in court."
