NEBRASKANS WILL
DRAFT SEN. NORRIS

LINCOLN, Neb., Aug. 15.—(AP)—James E. Lawrence, Lincoln editor and leader of a non-partisan movement to draft Senator George W. Norris, Nebraska independent republican, for another term, said today thousands of petitions to place Norris' name on the November election ballot as an independent would be filed within 10 days.

Norris declined to seek renomination in the primary last April but he was urged by President Roosevelt to serve another term and was endorsed by the state democratic convention.

Norris was elected to congress in 1903 and has represented Nebraska continuously since that year. He has been in the senate since 1913.

Terry Carpenter, Scottsbluff merchant and former congressman, won the democratic senatorial nomination and received the endorsement of the Townsend old age pension organization. Robert G. Simmons, Lincoln attorney and a former congressman, is the republican nominee.

PORTLAND, Aug. 19.—(AP)—There was little change in trading during the Wednesday session of the East Side Farmers' wholesale market. Offerings continued of reasonable volume.

Cantaloupes were in spots a trifle lower than the previous opening but much in line with the Tuesday closing. Sales of The Dillards stock were made 75-80c crate according to size of fruit except for the Hearts of Gold which were up to 90c crate. Grand Island Spears were priced mostly 65-90c crates with a few 60c while Yakima Vantage were around 60-65c generally with a few 75c crate. Dillard cantaloupes were to \$1.10 crate.
