OREGON EVENTS FLASHED FROM WIRE SERVICE

PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Regional Forester C. J. Buck said today that fire prevention and control forces in the Pacific northwest are depending on an increasing degree upon the airplane.

He declared it had been found practical to drop supplies from planes to fire fighters in remote regions, thus enabling them to blaze to the fire lines without being burdened by packs.

PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Joseph W. Thompson, Portland, has devised a new way for traffic officers to catch fleeing automobiles.

It is an invention, the "auto-cop," which resembles a huge set of sugar tongs.

The tongs are bolted onto the front of the police car and can be clamped onto the rear bumper or fender of the fleeing car.

Portland police reported they had tested the device 84 times and that it had failed only once.

gave the local "lock your car" campaign a boost today when he reported that a blanket had been stolen from his car while parked in front of the wrestling arena. The campaign is being conducted by city police.

The blanket was later recovered and an arrest made.

NEW PARTY PLAN DEFERRED TO 1940

MADISON, Wis., Aug. 20.—(AP)—Liberal leaders of Wisconsin and Minnesota turned their attention today toward formation of a national farmer labor party in 1940.

In a conference they agreed the time was not ripe for a new party movement this year and decided to have nothing to do with the Union party of Congressman William Lemke, North Dakota, and Father Charles Coughlin, Detroit radio priest.

Although some of the leaders voiced sentiment for support of President Roosevelt, to avoid splitting the liberal vote, the two groups decided that as a body they would withhold endorsement of any specific candidate.

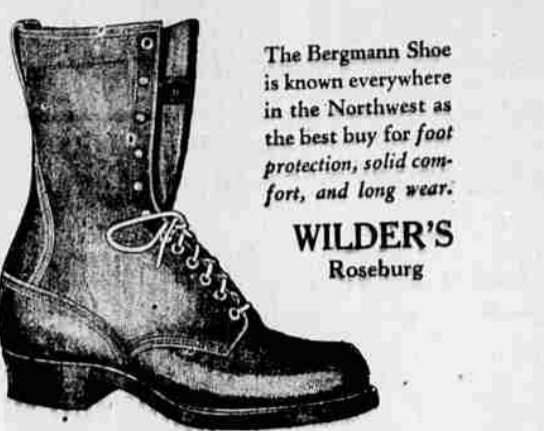
