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INJUNCTION HALTS CAFE PICKETING PORTLAND, Aug. 20.—(AP)—Picketed pickets, and those picketing then retired today from the downtown sidewalks of the Jolly Joan cafe under an injunction issued by Circuit Judge Hall S. Lusk.

Judge Lusk held that representatives of the culinary workers' union could not picket the restaurant in as much as there was no dispute between employer and employees.

The restaurant had picketed the union pickets by uniforming its employees with signs and parading them beside the union sidewalk picketers. The restaurant charged that the picketing was inspired by a union effort to organize the cafe workers.

PIE CHERRY JELLY MRS. FOSTER BUTNER Roseburg, Ore. 3 c cherry juice; 1/2 c sugar; 1 bottle Certo or jam jelly. To prepare juice, stem and crush 3 lbs. fruit. Do not pit. Add 1/2 c water, bring to a boil and simmer 10 min. Place in jelly bag and strain juice. Measure sugar and jelly into large saucepan and mix. Bring to a boil over hottest fire and at once add Certo, stirring constantly. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1/2 min. Remove from fire, skim, pour quickly into glasses. Pour hot paraffin over jelly.

FRENCH DRESSING D. H. SHOOK Roseburg, Ore. MRS. H. P. OGDEN, Eugene, Ore. 1 clove garlic 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. paprika Mix above ingredients together. Add 3/4 cup sugar, 1 cup salad oil, 1 cup vinegar, 1 cup catsup. Mix well and let stand 24 hours before using. Place in fruit jar and shake well before serving or mix with Dover
