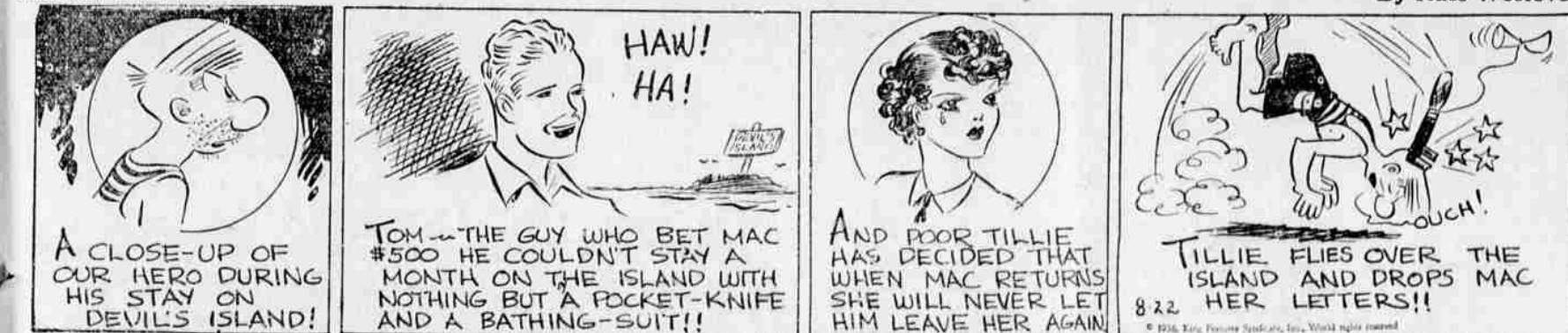

CALL FOR RELIEF WARRANTS ISSUED

Merchants of Roseburg and vicinity who still hold white warrants on the county relief office should turn them in within the next ten days for payment if they wish to have them honored, according to Franklin Voyt, in charge of relief work here.

"Some of these warrants were issued as far back as April of 1934," explained Mr. Voyt, "and we must have them in within this ten-day period so that we may clear up our files. There are still 117 requisitions totaling \$326.78 still outstanding, and since these outstanding warrants involve a great deal of bookkeeping, we are going to scrap whatever we have on file after ten days."

Warrants may be redeemed at the relief office in the Douglas county courthouse, according to Mr. Voyt.

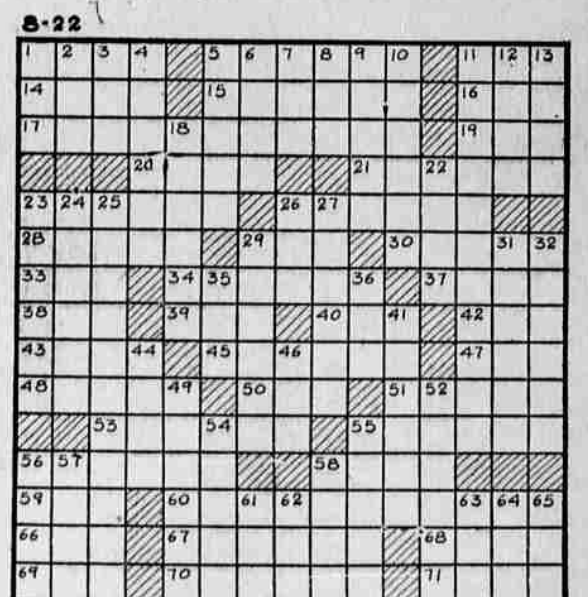
