

PORTLAND SPLITS WITH ANGELENOS

Seattle, Goaded by Owner
Klepper, Swamps Seals
by 18 to 0 Score.

By splitting a doubleheader with Los Angeles, Portland's Beavers today managed to remain a full game ahead of three rivals, all tied for remaining places in the first division of the Pacific Coast league.

The Angels made it four in a row over the Beavers by capturing the regulation length contest, 8-2, with Trim pitching fourth ball and Hurst leading an 11-hit attack against Steve Larkin. Home runs by Brunker and Cavanaugh accounted for the two Beaver runs.

In the short nightcap, Lieber was blasted for three runs in the seventh to give the league leaders a 5-3 win. Radonitski not credit for Portland's victory, although he had to be relieved in the last frame when the Angels had the tying run on base after a three-hit rally.

HERMAN ORDERED BACK TO CINCINNATI

CHICAGO, Aug. 21.—(AP)—Floyd "Babe" Herman, lanky outfielder who deserted the Cincinnati Reds last Thursday in a squabble over payment of a bonus, was ordered by Commissioner of Baseball Kenesaw Mountain Landis today to return to the club immediately.

The ruling was made after a conference between Landis, Herman and two officials of the Reds—Charles Drennon, the manager, and Larry MacPhail, business manager.

If at the end of the season the difficulty over the bonus has not been adjusted, Landis instructed Herman, the player, to report back to the commissioner for settlement.

Herman said the Cincinnati club had promised him a bonus of \$250 every two weeks provided he hustled. He said he had failed to receive the bonus for the last three weeks, which caused him to desert.

MacPhail was quoted as saying that Herman was the most overrated player in the National league and that his desertion saved the Reds about \$100 a day. Herman's salary was \$3,000 a year.

JIMMY AND MAX TO BATTLE NEXT YEAR

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The Jimmy Braddock-Max Schmeling heavyweight championship bout has been called off and rescheduled again—this time for either June 3 or 10, 1937.

Champion Jimmy, who started as the favorite a few days ago by reporting he had hurt his hand and wanted the fight postponed, made his second appearance before the New York state athletic commission, bringing a final report from the bone specialist assigned to examine his mitt. Dr. Fred Albee.

The commission's unwilling to call the whole thing off without further notice, ordered Braddock to begin treatments at once and report back for another examination Sept. 15. Since that would delay the program too long to hold an outdoor bout this year, the commission went into a huddle and came up with the signatures of both fighters on a new set of brackets calling for the 15-round bout to take place in June in the Garden of the Long Island city bowl.

Finally, Schmeling, who came from Germany on the ship Hindenburg only two weeks ago and was ready to begin training at Spaulding, N. Y., started back for home on the Bremen last night.

For Max was a bit worried for fear he would be sidetracked in favor of another opponent after he had refused a return bout with Joe Louis in September and he lost no time in signing up to fight next season when he learned Jimmy had agreed. The commission assured him Braddock would not be allowed to fight anyone ahead of him.

Dr. Albee's report was that Braddock is suffering from sub-arthritis of both elbows and his left hand; that he will have to undergo treatments for several weeks, and during that time he should not undertake the training grind.

WES FERRELL TO BE DROPPED BY BOSTON

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Wes Ferrell, the big right-hander who cost Tom Yawkey a large bundle of cash in his expensive rebuilding of the Red Sox, has been dropped by the team for 1936, and possibly his last game of all for the Boston outfit.

His prima donna temperament, which once before cost him \$1,500 for a ten-day suspension back in his days with the Cleveland Indians, drew a \$1,000 fine and a lay-off for the rest of the season from Manager Joe Cronin of the Sox yesterday, the heaviest punishment for any player this year.

He walked off the field without orders in the sixth inning of the game with the Yankees, just when murderers' row had put the game on ice with a three-run rally. Cronin, who was in the Red Sox dugout as Ferrell dejectedly left the mound and started toward the clubhouse, stopped on the field, apparently intending to follow him. He changed his mind, however, and stopped near home plate, obviously wondering what had caused Ferrell's action.

In the clubhouse later, even a shower didn't cool Cronin's anger. "I'm fining him \$1,000 and suspending him for the rest of the season," Cronin snapped. He can go home. He can go to China. I don't care. I don't want him around. He walked out on us last Sunday against the Senators, but today was tops."

This started talk that the Sox may consider trading Ferrell when the season winds up.

Ferrell has been the number two hurler on the Sox staff this season, only Lefty Grove topping him. His record, with yesterday's defeat, was 15 victories against the same number of defeats, for a .500 average.

ROOKIE BAT CHIEFS GOING LESS STRONG

NEW YORK, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The rookie sensations who have been threatening to provide something new for the books by taking the major league battings crosswise their first year up, showed definite signs of collapsing this week.

Both Johnny Mize of the Cardinals and Roy Weatherly of the Indians fell way off their pace of the previous week, although still maintaining slim holds on the batting leadership of the National and American leagues respectively.

While Earl Averill of the Indians and Lou Gehrig of the Yankees, second and third in the American league, picked up considerable ground, Weatherly hit at only slightly over a .260 clip for the week to drop 12 percentage points to .387. Averill moved up to .383, and Gehrig, with a seven point advance, hit .381.

Mize hit .374, followed by his teammate, Joe Medwick, .364, and Paul Wagner, Pirates, .350.

GIANTS WIN 10TH STRAIGHT GAME

Bonus Presented to Hurler
Gaber; Team Only Half
Game Under Cards.

That new suit of clothes Gaber Gabler will be sporting already has a history behind it.

It will represent \$100 from the New York Giants' treasury. Then, too, it's the result of the Giants' longest winning streak in 20 years—ten games.

Before the season started, Giants' Secretary Ed Brannick promised Gaber the new layout if he pitched eight victories.

Gaber finally hit his stride, just about the time the Giants began their comeback after their mid-season collapse. Yesterday he stopped the Reds 3-2 for his eighth win, his fourth in a row, and the Giants' tenth straight triumph, although he had to call on Coffman's ninth inning relief pitching to end a Boston rally.

This victory, coupled with the 5-4 trouncing Red Lucas and the Pirates pinned on the St. Louis Cardinals, shaved the Giants' distance from the league lead to half a game away from the pace-setting gas house gang.

Ferrell Takes Walk
The big league fireworks for the day were produced in the American league by the prima donna temperament of Wes Ferrell, the Boston Red Sox's number two pitcher, and the anger of his boss, Joe Cronin.

Ferrell walked out of the game with the Yankees just as murderers' row was hammering three runs over in the sixth inning to clinch a 4-1 decision.

Immediately talk started that Ferrell's career as a member of the gold-plated Sox cast is at an end, and that he may be a piece of trading ivory come September.

The Yankees maintained their 12-game lead on the rest of the American league pack, although the second-place Cleveland Indians belted over the St. Louis Browns, 12, with Weatherly bashing out a pair of homers.

The Tigers came from behind with a four-run rally in the eighth to knock off the White Sox 8-4, Lisenbee, hurling his first complete game of the year for the Athletics, held the Senators to seven hits for a 3-2 triumph.

Lee's hurling was too much for the Reds, and the Cubs, with a six-run explosion in the fifth, came through with a 7-2 decision, snapping their three-game losing streak. The Phillies and Dodgers took the day off, as per schedule.

SEATTLE, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Ranks of organized labor here grew tense today over the Seattle Post-Intelligencer newspaper strike as an American Federation of Labor representative pressed an investigation of the Seattle central labor council's action declaring the newspaper "unfair."

Rowland Watson, American Federation of Labor district representative here, said William Green, president, had asked for a "full report on one" of circumstances surrounding the strike called by the Seattle chapter of the American Newspaper Guild August 13.

Harvey J. Keller, general labor counsel for the Hearst newspapers, conferred with leaders of the printing trades whose members did not join the picket lines thrown about the building when the strike was called. Richard Selzer, president of the Seattle chapter, likewise discussed with union leaders the progress of the strike.

Indications of an immediate attempt to reopen the plant, closed since publication suspended August 14, were lacking.

Pickets of the build held forth outside the building in restricted numbers with a small detail of police stood by.

able for reviving ancient and discredited systems of society and government, and presenting them as the sure way of gaining Utopia. . . . The confidence of many of our people in our way of doing things has been shaken. They are wondering whether we may not have to scrap our American institutions.

"This doubt and distrust is fostered by unstable men to whom it is always dangerous to give political power. . . . Before the depression such phrases as 'the onward sweep of democracy' were commonplace. Now in many parts of the world, democracy is in retreat and dictators are advancing."

No Surrender to Despair
Defeatists, the governor said, contended "we must choose between freedom and security."

"Let us not surrender to any such counsel of despair," the candidate said. "Let us not abandon our determination to win security and abundance without sacrificing any of our precious heritage of freedom."

"In this depression as in every depression, there are timid souls who fear that the temporary setback is to be permanent. There is nothing to justify any such conclusion. We have had hard times before."

"We are told now, however, that we got out of previous depressions because of the natural growth of the country and the westward expansion of the frontier. We are warned that we are at the end of that era of expansion and must now face a new situation."

"The remedy offered is that the federal government shall restrict production, close out jobs and parcel out business opportunities. This argument, instead of being progressive, is 10 years behind the times."

Power "Barter" Decried
Referring to "proposals for changing" the form of government, Landon said "government power must always be used unflinchingly to correct the abuses and inequalities which admittedly exist."

"So far as possible," he said, "this should be done by the individual states or by compacts among the states. In the case of abuses beyond the power or jurisdiction of the states, federal authority should be used."

"I am, however, against the transfer to Washington of any power which can be more safely and efficiently administered by state and local governments."

"It is a fundamental principle of our American system that the federal government in Washington shall have only such powers as are specifically granted to it. The founders of our government knew all too well the evils of being governed from a distance."

"That distrust of centralized power was the beginning of our American liberty. We are now asked to barter it away for personal theories which have been tried and found wanting."

The Kansas said unemployment and "examples of special privilege" were defects which called for remedies.

"But I believe," he added, "that there is more promise for their solution by clinging to American ideals than under any other plan which has been proposed."

Real Work Needed
The remedy for unemployment is not a permanent dole. Of course relief must be continued as long as the need for it exists. The American remedy for unemployment is real work at good wages. It is clear that limitation of production and destruction of crops is not going to provide this kind of work."

Landon said "the frontier of new wants points the way to a better standard of living in this country."

"Even in our most prosperous days many of our people did not live well enough. How can it be said that we have over-production when so many Americans are badly clothed and badly housed? How can it be said we have over-production when large groups of our fellow citizens are neglected, underpaid, or unemployed? How dare we talk about over-production when the evil effects of these conditions run beyond the tragedy of wasted lives and challenge the stature and the honor of the nation? . . . These can never be settled while imagination and ingenuity distinguish American character."

SALEM, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Prisoners in the Oregon state penitentiary are interested in as wide a variety of reading matter as less restricted persons. Harriet Long, state librarian, declared in her biennial report filed with Governor Martin today.

The report showed that 10,988 of 17,473 books loaned to state institutions went into the penitentiary. In addition, 449 reading courses were taken by men in the prison.

Prisoners preferred books on drawing, navigation, travel, journalism, electricity, gardening, poultry and Oregon history.

Men in the CCC camps were also found to be consistent patrons of the library. Approximately 1,492 courses of study were prepared for these men during the biennium. Books shipped to the CCC camps numbered 21,024.

An additional 3,557 volumes were lent to state departments. This concession was in addition to reference and research service devoted by the library staff to find specific information for state officials.

The report showed there were 122 public libraries in Oregon at the end of 1935. Only 32 were in communities of more than 2,000 population. There were 65 libraries in communities of less than 1,000.

The report concluded with the suggestion that the next legislature consider an appropriation for the construction of a new state library building. Miss Long estimated that a structure suited to the requirements of her department could be built for \$500,000.

WOMAN IN MORALS
CASE COMMITTED
Mrs. Pale Dewar, arrested with her husband and Adrian Hausmann last week after Dewar had attacked Special Policeman Thompson, was committed to the state institution for feeble minded yesterday afternoon by Justice R. W. Masters. The other two accused in the morals case had been sentenced earlier. Dewar received a sentence of 60 days and a fine of \$150, while Hausmann received a sentence of 30 days and a fine of \$50.

FISH PLANTED IN
DOUGLAS WATERS
DAYS CREEK, Aug. 22.—(Special)—Four loads of steelhead fingerlings, each comprising 20,000 fish, were received this week by Earl Sumner and J. A. Rhoads for the Lanesville and Gun club. The fingerlings were sent from the Rock Creek hatchery.

One load of the fish was planted in Dead Man creek and one load each in Dumont creek, Boulder creek and in the river at South Umpqua falls.

62 DRUNKEN DRIVERS
FORFEIT LICENSES
SALEM, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Sixty-two automobile operators lost their licenses due to driving while intoxicated, during July, Earl Snell, secretary of state, reported today. Reversible driving resulted in 41 suspensions of licenses.

There were 991 convictions for motor vehicle law infractions during the month. In 15 cases the violators had never been licensed to drive in this state.

SALEM, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Motor vehicle owners who purchase a license for the first half of the year but do not intend to drive the third quarter are entitled to obtain a license for the fourth quarter at the quarter year rate. Attorney General Van Winkle held today.

U. S. ISSUES WARNING TO
AIRPLANE MANUFACTURER
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Seeking to discourage any effort to export American war materials to Spain, the state department today made public the text of a letter sent to an inquiring unnamed airplane manufacturer in which it asserted that such sales would violate the spirit of this government's neutrality policy.

UNITED STATES REFUSES TO
MEDDLE IN SPANISH MESS
WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Hope for an early termination of hostilities in Spain was coupled today by the United States government with a re-affirmation of determination to remain "scrupulously" aloof from the bitter revolutionary struggle there.

These expressions were set forth in a note dispatched last night by Acting Secretary of State William Phillips to J. Robinson, Uruguayan minister to Washington, rejecting Uruguay's proposal that the nations of the Americas join in a move to mediate the Spanish crisis.

Voicing this government's desire to support the principle of non-interference in the internal affairs of other nations.

MUCH READING DONE
IN OREGON PRISON
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M'NARY TELLS OF LEADER'S "ORDEAL"

PORTLAND, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The task of leading the republican forces in the senate is a routine "ordeal" that is not "all joy in trying to represent the dear people," Senator Charles L. McNary remarked in an address here before the city club.

"It is hard to find any one group advocating any particular kind of legislation," the republican floor leader said, and the depression imposed about tenfold the mail of congressmen and senators.

The flood of correspondence imposes a burden not such an extent that "we find it hard to follow our own consciences," Senator McNary said.

Touching upon famous characters of congress, Senator McNary said Vice President Garner, who presides over the upper house, has a heart that has "far outgrown his democratic floor leader," "has an unwieldy, top-heavy majority of which he frequently loses control on the democratic side."

The late President Harding, the senator remarked, probably was "magnified" as much as any man in public life, and former President Hoover, "not as popular as he should have been," is more popular now than during his administration.

DEATH ASKED FOR
RUSSIAN PLOTTERS
MOSCOW, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The death penalty for all 16 confessed conspirators against the soviet union was demanded today by Prosecutor Andrei J. Vishinsky.

"This mad dog must be shot," Vishinsky demanded.

"Every one of them must be killed."

The prisoners blanched visibly before the onslaught of words.

"A pitiful and disgraceful end awaits these people," said Vishinsky.
