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GROUPS TO CONFER ON STRIKE AT P-I

SEATTLE, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Newspaper publishers of the Pacific northwest received a call today to confer here Wednesday on the Seattle Post-Intelligencer's newspaper strike which caused the newspaper to suspend publication August 14.

Robert Mount, Portland, secretary of the Pacific Northwest Newspaper association, notified the members of the meeting and urged the allied dailies of Washington and the Washington Newspaper association to join in the session.

Two other meetings dealing with the Post-Intelligencer strike were arranged for this week.

The Seattle chapter of the American Newspaper Guild, which called the strike August 12, in protest against the discharge of two of its members, set a mass meeting for Tuesday to explain the reasons for the strike and circumstances leading up to it.

The law and order league, its organizers not yet announced, invited "public spirited citizens" to attend a session to be held this week.

An investigation by a representative of the American Federation of Labor into circumstances under which the Seattle central labor council pronounced the Post-Intelligencer unfair to organized labor was under way, with prospects it would be completed and sent to William Green, president, here tomorrow.

Executives of the Post-Intelligencer continued to charge "strong arm" methods of build pickets, composed of longshoremen, teamsters and woodsmen, prevented operation of the plant.

Jonathan Eddy, New York, executive secretary of the American Newspaper guild, countered that the Post-Intelligencer was "trying to make a very ordinary strike look like mob violence."

There was no attempt by the executives of the Hearst-owned newspaper to reopen the plant and pickets roamed the sidewalks outside the "editors and reporters" were on strike.

URGES CLOSE STUDY OF POWER MEASURE

"A large portion of voters do not realize that for whatever purpose bonds may be voted or public debts incurred, the general taxpayer usually is responsible for payment thereof," said Elbert Biele, until recently editor of the Oregonian, while a visitor here today.

"That is true," he said, "of such bonds and debts as those for a city water system, for city streets, etc., that are supposed to be paid from special funds. This will be found true of bonds that could be issued or debts that might be incurred through authority of the state power bill, now before the people and opposed by Oregon Business and Investors, which I represent. Receipts from the power business would be expected to pay the bills, but the general fund of the state would have to pay if the experiment should not prove successful. The general fund would be injured anyway for millions of dollars would be removed from the tax rolls when private concerns found they could not compete with the state."

"We are making progress now in reducing our bonded and warrant indebtedness, and the organization I represent does not wish to see the good work so well begun, especially when to shoulder this debt seems unnecessary. If the idea is to take advantage of cheap power from Bonneville, let the government deliver it, let it be distributed over systems we now have, or over systems to be provided by small units, with rates in accordance with the cost of Bonneville power."

"Those who do not relish the idea of higher taxes will do well to study the power bill and observe particularly what kind of a commission we may get through popular election and the entire lack of restraint placed upon their expenditure of state funds may be provided or may be received through the operation of a business that would put present business out of business."

EVANGELIST NULL WILL SPEAK HERE

Carleton E. Null, of Los Angeles, head of the department of evangelism of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, and executive secretary of the Pocket Testament League, a nationwide organization, will speak in the Presbyterian church Tuesday night at 8 p.m. Rev. W. C. Fayette, pastor of the church, has announced.

Mr. Null, a former business man, began his present work in personal evangelism, walking over the country and speaking with those he contacted in his journeys about the Christian life, according to Rev. Fayette. His work soon attracted the attention of prominent church leaders and he was invited by Dr. Paul Root, president of the Bible Institute of Los Angeles, to head the department of evangelism of that school.

Mr. Null's work is strictly interdenominational and all churches are invited to the Tuesday evening meeting.

COOS NOMINATION DECLINED BY STACK

COQUILLE, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Harry Stack, chairman of the Coos county republican central committee, removed his name today from a list of candidates suggested for the party nomination for state

senator from Coos and Curry counties.

Nominating committees will meet here tomorrow to name a successor to the late John Blegger, killed in an automobile accident last June. Ben R. Chandler, Marshfield banker and runner-up to Blegger at the May primary, was prominently mentioned for the post.

OREGON HARVESTS FINE TOMATO CROP

PORTLAND, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The finest Oregon tomato crop in several years began to move to market this month, with production estimated by the U. S. department of agriculture at 257,000 bushels.

The expected yield exceeds the 1935 figure by 122,000 bushels and runs above the 1928-32 average by 166,000 bushels.

In a survey, the department pointed out that crop conditions for tomatoes generally were 10 per cent under 1935 in most sections of the United States, giving the Oregon grower the benefit of an improved market.

All states except Oregon, Utah and Washington reported estimated yields under 1935 or at the best no larger than last year.

Favorable conditions encouraged cabbage growers, although the department's report estimated the 1936 yield at 14,000 tons, 2,300 under the 1928-32 average but 600 above 1935.

A watermelon crop exceeding both the 1928-32 average and the 1935 production was forecast. The department fixed the yield at 114,000 melons against 84,000 last year and an average of 75,000 over 1928-32.

HOOVER'S ADMIRER 'MUFFS' BIG CHANCE

EUGENE, Aug. 22.—(AP)—So long as former President Herbert C. Hoover does not turn on the "firehose chats" and WPA project programs he may play his card as loudly as he likes on Springfield street, in the opinion of one Springfield man, who, along with his friends and neighbors was once following an encounter with the former president Friday afternoon.

The man was in a Springfield jewelry store when a big car drew up in front and parked. Two ladies left the car while the two men in it turned on the radio. The music sounding forth could be heard for blocks. The customer in the store decided he had better request the men "to tune down." He did, reminding the two men in the car they were parked in front of a city councilman's store. As he walked on down the street one of his fellow citizens stopped him with this remark:

"Do you know who that is in that big car? That is Herbert Hoover." No, 1 man was able to see the joke this morning, but today was quite charmed to think he had missed the chance of a life time since he is known as one of Springfield's most staunch republicans and a great admirer of Hoover.

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Edsel Ford returned today from a five week's tour of Europe with the report that business conditions appeared to be greatly improved in virtually every European country.

"There certainly is every indication that the world depression is over," he said. "There seems to be a better feeling all around."
