PROGRESS FETE TO BE HELD AT BEND

BEND, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Celebration of a quarter of a century of progress since central Oregon was opened to railroad traffic by completion of the Hill and Harriman lines up the Deschutes gorge at a cost of \$25,000,000 will be observed here Oct. 17.

A golden spike marking the end of construction of the railroads was driven on Oct. 5, 1911, by James J. Hill, empire builder, but a committee planning the celebration was forced to postpone the memorial event because of a conflict of dates with the county fair.

One of the features of the celebration will be a duplication of the ceremonies which attended the completion of the railroads.

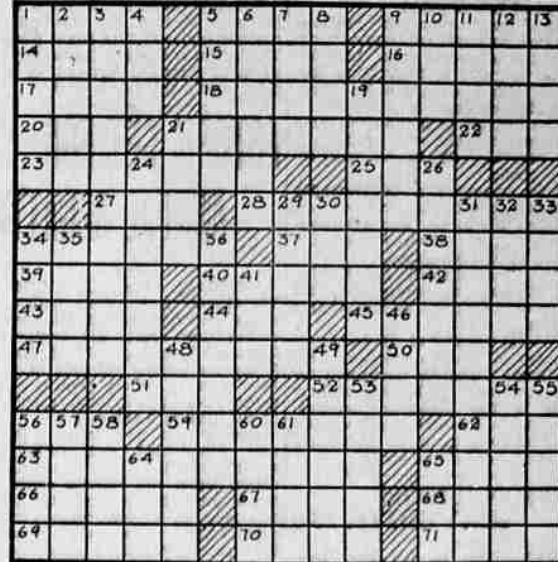
