

GIANTS ONLY HALF GAME UNDER CARDS

National League Flag Race Tightens; Youth Fans 15 in Big League Debut.

It took for a time yesterday as though the wily Giants had taken the bit in their teeth and the National League lead in their hands by knocking off the Boston Bees in both ends of a double-header, 3 to 2 and 6 to 1.

Then the Cards came from behind in the first game of their twin bill with Pittsburgh to chalk up a 7-3 win, and pulled up in the last three innings of the nightcap to earn a 6-1 tie and save their first place by half a game.

The American league meantime uncovered a 17-year-old "boy wonder," the Indians' Bob Feller—in his first big league start. He held the St. Louis Browns to six hits for a 4-1 win, and fanned 15 batters, falling just short of the American league strikeout record.

This victory boosted the Tribe half a game in their chase of the pennant-bound New York Yankees, who managed only a split with their season-long punching bag, the Red Sox, thereby cutting their pennant margin to 11 games. Gehrig's 4th homer helped in the opener 5-3, after which the Sox, smarting under 12 straight defeats at the hands of murderers' row, landed on the league's leading pitcher, Hadley, for a 6-3 triumph.

The Cubs finally showed some signs of returning to form by holding the Cincinnati Reds 7-0, behind Larry French's fourth pitching. The White Sox pulled back into a contending spot for the American league's third spot by downing the Tigers 4-2 behind Whitehead's nine-hit pitching, while the Senators dropped the Athletics twice, Appleton silencing five hits in winning the opener 5-3, and Kubel and Kress belting homers to help in the 9-6 nightcap decision.

The Dodgers beat the Phillies 6-5 with a four-run spree in the eighth, but the Phils blasted Mungo and two other Brooklyn pitchers to win the nightcap, 5-3.

BEAVERS HOLD ONE GAME LEAD

The Beavers took the first game yesterday 5-4, but were subdued in the nightcap, 4-3, in an extra-inning finale.

After sweeping a doubleheader Saturday, the Indians dropped yesterday's tilt to the San Francisco Seals, 7-2, and thereby lost the series by the odd game.

San Diego divided the Sunday bill 3-7, 5-4, and clung to third place over Oakland by a one-game margin.

Paroled outpitched three Angel flingers to win the first game for Portland. Clabaugh accounted for five runs with his homer and long flier. In the scheduled seven-inning finale, the clubs had to battle until the eighth when Bottarini's home run ended the strife.

JESSE OWENS TO RETURN TO COLLEGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Jesse Owens, Ohio State's great negro athlete, winner of four gold medals in the Olympic games, arrived today from Europe on the liner Queen Mary and declared he had definitely decided only on one thing—that he would return to Ohio State for another year to get his degree in physical education.

Greeted by one of the biggest delegations that ever went down the bay to welcome a sports celebrity, Owens told reporters he had made no definite commitments along the professional lines.

Owens answered questions of 50 newspapermen almost as fast as he ran in Berlin.

"No, I have no hard feeling against the A. A. U., in fact, I haven't been notified that I was suspended. I was very tired after the Olympics and the most Olympic meets and I figured that, inasmuch as people pay to see track stars at their best, I had better stop running over there. I was too tired to do my best."

"No, I do not think Hitler snubbed me. Please remember that he is a very busy man. It seemed that each time I finished running, he was scheduled to leave. Once, he waved to me and smiled and I waved right back."

SENATOR COUZENS BACKS ROOSEVELT

DETROIT, Aug. 22.—(AP)—United States Senator James Couzens, Republican, in a statement today announced his intention of supporting President Roosevelt for re-election.

Senator Couzens' statement in full read:

"Believing as I do that the most important matter confronting the nation is the re-election of President Roosevelt, I intend to support him."

"The outcome of my own candidacy for the senate is neither important to the nation nor to me, but I believe it is important that many loyal supporters in Michigan be advised in advance of the primary September 15."

"The reasons for this conclusion will be advanced from time to time between now and election next November."

CATTLE UNHURT BY SQUIRREL POISON

PORTLAND, Aug. 24.—(AP)—F. E. Garbough, biological survey research worker, said in a paper received here that cattle are not injured by squirrel poison, properly distributed.

In a recent experiment Garbough found that cattle and sheep had to be forced to eat grain containing the poison and that it took a considerable quantity of the bait to kill either. A cow would have to consume about 100 pills of the poison to get an overdose and a sheep about 20.

MADRID AIRDROME SHELLED BY REBELS

Sunday, rebels claimed 21 planes dropped 400 bombs.

French sympathizers of Spanish government forces reported more than 100 inhabitants of Iran had been killed in an intensive bombardment by rebel airplanes today.

The report, however, could not be confirmed, since the frontier was closed tightly.

From Hendaye, France, insurgent air forces could be seen dropping heavy loads of bombs on the Spanish loyalists.

Three planes, flying in formation, circled the Bay of Biscay city three times and dropped a dozen bombs, then turned toward the coast after 15 minutes of attack without encountering resistance.

The planes looked new, gleaming in the sunlight, and apparently used heavier bombs than those of previous war craft. The detonations were much greater in intensity.

Chased by Loyalists

The Madrid bulletin said, however, that the bombing damage of the capital was slight.

A squadron of government planes pursued the rebel fliers, who sped back to Seville after dropping several bombs.

Government leaders feared the rebels from Badajoz, in the west, would reach Madrid by the way of the Aguiar river valley and Toledo.

Reports that rebels in both the north and south were able to reach Burgos by rail from Seville, via Badajoz, added to government misgivings.

Faced with a grim and more active rebel attack on the Guadarrama mountain front north of Madrid, the government could ill spare men to stem the fresh insurgent assault from the west.

FIVE FRENCHMEN WITH LOYALISTS EXECUTED

PAMPLONA, Spain, Aug. 21.—Spanish rebel officers reported today the execution of five Frenchmen fighting for the loyalist government and warned that other French nationals who join in the civil war may expect the same fate.

Accusing France of aiding the Spanish socialist regime, the fascist officers asserted the five

French volunteers were captured in a battle near Oyarzun and put to death.

Claims of victories and the charges against France alternated in a flood of communiques issuing from insurgent headquarters here.

Despite French denials, rebels insisted that a fleet of 15 French planes bombed Navalport and that other war craft crossed the Pyrenees on the northern border and bombed Oyarzun and Tolosa.

The ships then returned to France, the rebels asserted.

Invasion Repulsed

The loyalist force invading the island of Mallorca, in the Mediterranean, it was charged here, was composed largely of French and Russian volunteers and the militia was using French munitions.

Insurgents asserted that the invasion of Mallorca had been beaten back with 5,000 killed. One thousand prisoners were taken in a battle at Corboba, the fascists said.

Officers said that animosity toward France was increased by discovery of a French automobile at Burgos loaded with dynamite. The rebels said they suspected a scheme to blow up their headquarters there.

PARIS, Aug. 24.—French officials today disclaimed any part by the government in reported service of French volunteers with the Spanish government army.

While officials said they had heard nothing of the reported execution of five French volunteers captured by rebels, one spokesman said "that is one of the risks of war. If a national of one country makes the affairs of another he must take the consequences. The government can do nothing for him."

The spokesman added that the government was unable to prevent "adventurers" from enlisting abroad.

GERMANY AGREES TO JOIN IN NEUTRALITY STAND

BERLIN, Aug. 24.—Germany agreed today to declare an embargo on arms and airplane shipments to Spain, it was officially announced.

Baron Konstantin von Neurath, foreign minister, informed Andre Francé-Poncet, French ambassador, that Germany would decree an embargo effective immediately without awaiting outcome of the dispute over a confiscated German airplane assertedly seized by the Spanish loyalist government.

The government expressed the hope that France and other governments participating in the neutrality negotiations will also insofar as they have not already done so—take steps to carry out effectively the neutrality measures agreed upon.

PARIS, Aug. 24.—Germany's agreement to embargo arms and airplanes to Spain was hailed by the French foreign office today as a first step toward a final settlement of the international neutrality accord.

With the last major holdout joining the ranks of the nations agreeing to isolate the war on the Iberian peninsula, French officials said the German action would "facilitate enormously" final negotiations.

BRITISH WARSHIPS WILL PREVENT SHIP SEIZURES

LONDON, Aug. 24.—British men-of-war were instructed today to prevent interference with English shipping off western Spain after quick action by his majesty's navy settled one dangerous incident.

A battle cruiser and two destroy-

ers, their decks cleared for action, sped to aid an English merchantman when she was halted and boarded by officers of a Spanish government cruiser off Melilla, Spanish Morocco.

The commander of the destroyer Codrington, responding to a wireless appeal from the merchantman, boarded a Spanish cruiser and the Spaniards apologized, apparently settling the highly dangerous matter.

The merchant ship was allowed to proceed to Melilla, which is in the hands of Spanish insurgents, to discharge its cargo. Owners of the ship said it carried no munitions.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 24.—The Spanish government today formally obligated itself to reimburse American property holders whose property may be seized during the civil strife in Spain.

BALTIMORE, Aug. 24.—Delivery of eight bombing planes now being constructed for the Spanish leftist government probably will not be made on the original date set for October or November.

Byrnes Has Opposition

In South Carolina Senator Byrnes, another administration stalwart, is opposed for re-nomination by Thomas P. Stoney, former mayor of Charleston, and Col. William C. Harllee, former marine of

Byrnes campaigned on his record and that of the new deal, while his opponents, saying they had no criticism of President Roosevelt, spoke against what they termed "radical elements" in the party.

Delaware republicans on Thursday will make a senatorial nomination and, despite Senator Hastings' announcement that he will not run again, there has been talk of drafting him.

On Other Fronts

In the fast-moving campaign activities the announcement of Senator Couzens (R., Mich.), that he would support President Roosevelt for re-election, brought swift reaction.

Couzens is a candidate for re-nomination. His opponent, former Governor Wilbur M. Brucker, said Couzens' stand "will have the immediate effect of solidifying all those forces in opposition to the new deal." Senator Vandenberg (R., Mich.), declared that he disagreed "with my distinguished colleague's conclusions" but "I commend him for his usual candor."

Townsendites at a rally in Columbus, O., yesterday heard the Rev. Gerald L. K. Smith say that a world war was being generated in Europe and that "the brain trust administration now in power under Mr. Roosevelt will attempt to throw us on the side of Russia."

Dr. Francis E. Townsend's old age pension organization today staked its political strength in the elderly founder's own state of California on the outcome of tomorrow's California congressional primary.

Victory for Townsend endorsed candidates in 12 of the state's 20 congressional districts was predicted by E. J. Margrett, state manager for the organization.

The outstanding test is admittedly in the third district where Sheridan Downey, personal attorney for Dr. Townsend, is running against Representative Frank H. Buck for the democratic nomination.

"I would not," Townsend replied, "if they did not interfere with the employees in their routine."

Doctor on Salary Basis

Dr. Townsend said that he was not on the payroll of the Townsend movement. He said that he was paid on a salary basis until the opening of the congressional hearing last spring.

"I received \$50 a week and expenses," the doctor said, "and, for a month or two, \$125 a week and expenses."

Sacharow claimed his investigation of records disclosed the doctor

received nine checks of \$125 each, a total of \$1,125, last February.

"That's new to me," the doctor commented. Tucker objected to Sacharow's statements, claiming he "assumed they were salary checks."

The judge remarked that Sacharow "has not proved them to be only salary checks."

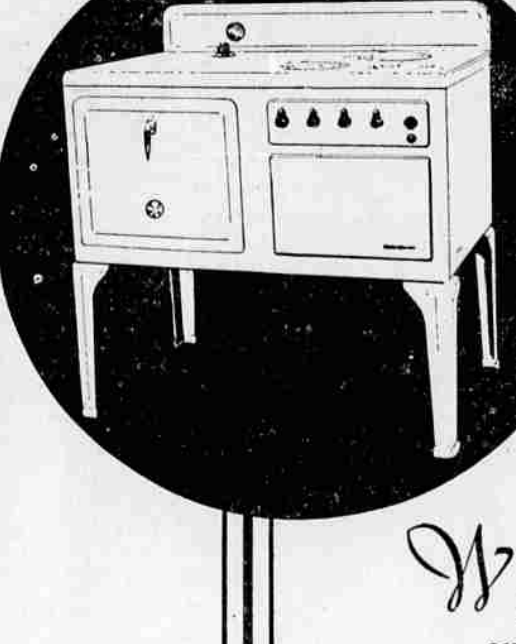

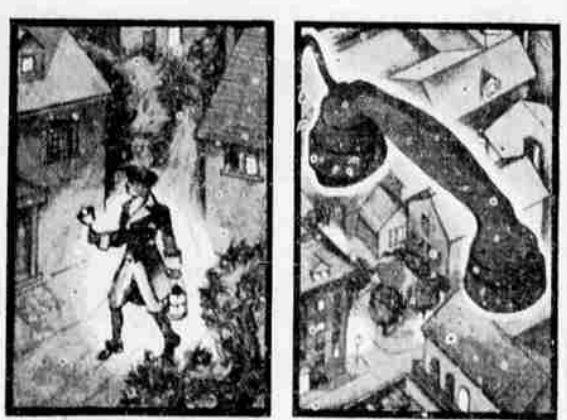
