

GIANTS TIE CARDS FOR FIRST PLACE

The National League pennant race may be decided between now and September fourth although the season still has more than a month to run.

The stage was set for a "crucial" finale yesterday when the Pittsburgh Pirates, replaying Sunday's tie game, handed the St. Louis Cardinals an unmerciful 17 to 5 thrashing and sent them into a tie with the idle New York Giants for first place.

Paul Dean, making his first start since July 4, showed no signs of the sore arm which has been bothering him, but he couldn't keep the Cards on top. Given a comfortable lead by a four-run inning, he weakened in the fourth inning and retired before an attack that tied the count.

Meanwhile the Cubs, only 33 games off the pace and holding a fine spot to go places if they can hit the same clip in their home park as they did at the same stage last year, had a stiff struggle with Cincinnati's Reds. They finally won out in the tenth inning, 2 to 1.

In the only other game of the big league program, the Chicago White Sox continued their bid for third place in the American league by hammering out an 8 to 4 decision over Detroit's Tigers.

Bridges nor Sorrell could check the Chicago hitters and between them they handed the Sox nine free trips to first.

WOMAN, FARM BOY TOP TRAPSHOOTERS

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Two of the most coveted prizes in the trapshoot realm—the North American amateur clay target championships for men and women—were on the block today as the 37th annual Grand American program entered its second day.

Joe Hiestand, the Hillsboro, O., farmer boy, and ranking star of the sport today, is the men's defending champion, while Mrs. Lora Hall, petite wife of an East Lynn, Mo., restaurant operator, wears the feminine laurels.

Not only is Mrs. Hall the leader of the "weaker sex," but she is the champion of the world's class B shooters. She tied four men at 197 out of 200 a year ago and then beat them in a shoot-off to take the laurels, the highest a woman has won over the traps.

Hale C. Jones, 29-year-old automobile salesman from East Alton, Ill., won his first Grand American title yesterday after years of effort by beating all other state champions in a 200-target race. He broke 196 of 200 to tie B. M. Jenkins of Orleans, Ind., for the crown, and then broke 25 in a row in the shoot-off to win, Jenkins missing his 22nd target.

INDIANS TOP LIST IN FIGHT VICTORS

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Preliminary battles for Pacific coast amateur diamond belt championships today left a diminished field of young sluggers, including several Indians who refused to bite the dust.

Three Indians from Arizona—Willie Numkena, 112-pound Hopi; Mervin Ringers, 175-pound Pima; and King Mike, 118-pound Navajo—remained among the battlers from six states who will return to the ring for semi-finals and finals in eight divisions tomorrow night. Numkena wore his moccasins in the ring.

The Nevada and Arizona teams were composed entirely of Indians. Tom Moynar of Portland reached the 126-pound semi-finals in the tournament by hammering out a decision over Herman Hernandez of Fresno, Calif., in a quarter-final match after earlier defeating Don Sam, Nevada Plate Indian.

Charles Nottingham of Portland was another victor in a first round match, pinning a technical knock-out on John Alvarez, Oakland, in the first round of a 160-pound battle.

Jack Buhlman, also of Portland, suffered elimination in his first start when Willie Numkena, Hopi Indian from Arizona, shuffled his way to a decision in the 112-pound class. Numkena laughed all the way through the bloody, hard-fought match.

In the 135-pound class, Jerry Buckley of Portland drew a first round bye, then lost a decision to Edwin Stanley of the San Francisco press. The same fate overtook Roy Quisenberry, 147-pound Portlander, who was defeated by David Nichols of Los Angeles.

Cliff Nelson, St. Helens, Ore., scrapper, dropped a decision to King Mike, Navajo Indian 118-pounder, in a first-round battle. Nelson suffered a cut eye, while Mike improved as the fight went along.

MAX BAER BILLED FOR BOUT TONIGHT
PORTLAND, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The Baer family of California will show Portland boxing fans their wares tonight when ex-champion Max and his brother Buddie will be featured in Promoter Harry Hansen's bill at Multnomah stadium.

The one-time Livermore playboy will attempt to climb another step up the comeback stairway against Cecil Myatt, Los Angeles negro, while the 228-pound Buddie will mix with Bill Devere, San Francisco. Both bouts will be for six rounds.

FEHL'S SUIT OVER PAROLE DISMISSED

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling dismissed today the suit brought by Karl H. Fehl seeking to overthrow the prohibition in his parole from the state penitentiary denying him the right to return to Jackson county until his full four-year term was ended.

The judge held the complaint did not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of suit, and further that he had no jurisdiction over the subject matter in the case.

Fehl, former Jackson county judge, contended he had served his full time with credit for good behavior. He was received at the prison August 15, 1933, under the four-year indeterminate sentence.

Fehl asked for a decree declaring his conditional parole void, and for an injunction restraining any interference in his return to Jackson county.

Another suit, involving habeas corpus proceedings filed by Fehl's wife, Elsie Fehl, in attempt to obtain his unconditional release, is now on appeal in the state supreme court.

"A great number of people who formerly lived in the drought states of Kansas, North Dakota, Nebraska and Iowa, have moved to Oregon and are applying for drivers' licenses," stated Otto Gilstrap, who, with others of the secretary of state's office in charge of this function, are in Roseburg today and tomorrow examining applicants.

"Washington and even California are well represented also, but it is evident that many people from the drought states are becoming Oregon residents and want Oregon operators' licenses," Mr. Gilstrap declared. "Of course we have applicants from every state in the union, but these particular states seem to be well in the lead."

The group of examiners is on the first floor of the Douglas county courthouse.

CARDINALS RECALL PITCHER PIPPEN
ST. LOUIS, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Branch Rickey, vice-president of the Cardinals, announced today Henry (Cotton) Pippin, 24-year-old star hurler of the Sacramento Pacific coast league club, has been recalled to help the Red Birds pitching staff in the National league pennant drive.

Pippin's winning of 10 consecutive games for Sacramento was heralded as the outstanding feat of the Coast league season.

He was ordered to fly to St. Louis immediately and Rickey said the former Texas College of Mines athlete might be in readiness for Thursday's game with Boston.

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BREWER HOME ON N. MYRTLE BURNS

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FIGHT LOOMS OVER JOBLESS INSURANCE

SALEM, Aug. 24.—(AP)—The petition of the Pinnacle Packing company and others for an order temporarily restraining the state unemployment compensation insurance commission from collecting employers' contributions, will be opposed vigorously by the attorney general's office, it was announced here today.

The suit, which asked for both a temporary and permanent restraining order, was filed in Jackson county last week. Arguments on the temporary restraining order will be heard by the court there next Monday. Copies of the complaint were served on the commission today.

The complaint contended that the law creating the fund was unconstitutional in that it violated both the state and federal constitutions.

A number of other packing companies joined with the Pinnacle Packing company in prosecuting the suit.

The commission declared today that temporary restraining order would result in irreparable damage to the commission and would prevent collections until the court ruled on the application for a permanent order.

Records show that the commission already has collected in excess of \$750,000. It was estimated that collections for the entire year would total \$1,500,000.

Administrative costs are paid by the federal government.

KARPIS GANGSTER DRAWS FOUR YEARS
ST. PAUL, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Four three year sentences to run concurrently were imposed on Byron Bolton, erstwhile Barker-Karpis gangster, who went 15 of his underworld pals to prison, by Federal District Judge M. M. Joyce today.

Bolton, star witness for the government in the trials of various gang members convicted of the \$200,000 Edward G. Bremer and the \$100,000 William Hamm kidnappings, had pleaded guilty to each of three abduction charges.

George F. Sullivan, United States district attorney, urged the court to be lenient, explaining to Judge Joyce that Bolton's testimony enabled the government to indict 29 kidnapers, among them Alvin Karpis and Arthur (Doc) Barker, gang leaders now serving life in Alcatraz.

ALBERT GARRETT OF GLENDALE DIES
Albert Garrett, 23, of Glendale, died at the Josephine general hospital in Grants Pass, according to word received here today. He was admitted to the hospital Wednesday for medical care and died Saturday.

Funeral arrangements were not announced.

YOUTH SHOOT AT BIRD, SLAYS GIRL
FAIRFIELD, Calif., Aug. 25.—(AP)—Sixteen-year-old Herbert Thomas, Jr., fired a small-caliber rifle at a bird in his orchard and from a tree tumbled a young girl, fatally wounded by a shot through the head.

JAPAN EXECUTES 9 SOVIET CITIZENS
TOKYO, Aug. 24.—Japan's general army headquarters in Hsinking, Manchoukuo, today announced nine alleged soviet citizens had been executed on the outskirts of Hailar.

The executions, the communique said, were carried out last Friday. Twenty-eight others were sentenced to prison terms of five to 20 years.

A Dornier (Japanese) news agency dispatch from Hsinking asserted the condemned Russians were "remnants of a secret delegation which the soviet sent to Manchoukuo in 1924 and 1925, charged with settling the three rivers district, a colony lying 75 miles north of Hailar, near the Argun river on the border of Siberia."

This colony always has been considered white Russian, and hostile to the Moscow government.

TINY AUTO PLANT TO BE SHOWN HERE

Douglas county residents are to be offered an opportunity to see an automobile factory in actual operation. The plant will not, of course, be full size but will be complete in every detail in miniature.

Two Roseburg motor car dealers, the St. Dillard Motor company and the Motor Shop garage, announce today that an exact scale reproduction of the plant of the Plymouth Motor company, housed in a specially built trailer towed by a standard Plymouth coupe, will be placed on exhibition in Roseburg September 3. The exact location of the exhibit will be announced later it was stated.

The model, said by Plymouth officials to have cost \$20,000, is an exact scale reproduction of the plant Plymouth plant, where completed cars roll off the assembly lines at the rate of three a minute. It is 20 feet long and four feet wide, compared to an actual area of 44 acres covered by the real Plymouth plant in Detroit.

The special trailer which carries the equipment is also equipped with a public address system for the lectures and is also equipped with special motion picture apparatus for nightly screen entertainment during the demonstration.

TROTZKY SAYS REVENGE REMAINS HIS 'DUTY'
HOENEFOSS, Norway, Aug. 25.—(AP)—Leon Trotsky declared today it was his duty to "revenge" the 16 men executed in Moscow for an anti-Stalin conspiracy.

The soviet government accused Trotsky, celebrated bolshevik exile, as the absent master of the plot.

"My duty is to unmask one of the greatest crimes in the world's history, and to avenge the execution," said Trotsky.

The executions in Moscow were necessary to prevent any revived defendants from unmasking the ogre (soviet secret police).

"But I, who was represented as the chief promoter, am still alive!"
