ORANGE AND ONION SALAD
MRS. W. C. FAUCETT, Roseburg.
Grate or thinly slice sweet onions on sliced oranges. Top with small amount of salad dressing and chopped nuts if desired.

MINT JELLY
MISS MILDRED COATS, Wilbur, Ore.
1 cup fresh mint leaves (lightly crushed)
2 cups water
1/2 cup vinegar
3 cups sugar
1/2 cup prepared fruit pectin (liquid)

Put water, vinegar and mint leaves and sugar into large kettle. Bring to boil over very hot fire. Stir constantly. As soon as mixture boils, add pectin and bring to full rolling boil. Boil hard 1/2 minute. Remove from fire and skim—leaves and all. Pour into glasses and seal at once with paraffin. This is very good served with meats.

LATE SETH CROY BURIED AT CAMAS

CAMAS VALLEY, Aug. 26.—(Special)—Seth Croy of Camas Valley, died at the age of 36 in the Mast hospital in Myrtle Point, Aug. 13, following an accident in a logging camp the day before, in which he was injured by falling logs. He was buried in the family plot in Noah cemetery in Camas Valley.

Mr. Croy is survived by his wife, Mrs. Lette Croy, a six-year-old daughter, Madeline; his father, S. H. Croy, two brothers, Jake and Bud Croy, and three sisters, Mrs. Blanche Curtis, Mrs. Bertha Blackert and Mrs. Stella Cribbins.

He was born and raised in Camas Valley and made his home here most of the time except at intervals when working elsewhere. He was working near Myrtle Point, loading trucks with logs at the time of the fatal accident.

HAUPTMANN CASE PUBLICITY SCORED

(Continued from page 1)

man of New Jersey occupy nearly four pages of the report, which said:

"The spectacle of a member of a court or board of persons going about searching for evidence which may impinge the verdict, calling upon prospective applicants in their cells, indulging in public discussion of the merits of the case established in court * * * is repugnant to our sense of propriety and is in our opinion unwarranted."

"We voice no criticism of the action of the governor in granting a reprieve or in making such investigation as he deemed proper in the exercise of the functions of his office, but we cannot justify as persons' insinuations or charges made in connection therewith unless based upon fact or demonstrably probable proof."

Reform Urged.

In conclusion the committee made its recommendations for reform of courtroom procedure. Included were bans upon the use of cameras in the courtroom, the use of subpoenas to secure spectators' seats in court, bulletins by the defendant or counsel upon the case by counsel or witnesses and vaudeville appearances by jurors after the trial.

The fact that Governor Hoffman also was a member of New Jersey's court of pardons which twice considered appeals of Bruno Richard Hauptmann for commutation of his death sentence for the murder of the Lindbergh baby, made the governor's activities particularly "repugnant," the committee report said.

It criticized his visit to Hauptmann in prison and his "insinuations" that evidence was "framed." Dr. Condon, the aged intermediary in the ransom negotiations, was "decidedly out of place" in writing a series of articles for a magazine while the fate of Hauptmann was still undecided, the committee said.

Paid interviews by jurors after the trial were "clearly objectionable," an article by a former member of Hauptmann's counsel, Edward J. Reilly, trial counsel, was "grossly improper," and the taking of pictures in the courtroom against the injunction of the presiding judge was "indefensible," the report stated.

The committee criticized what it termed the "trial by newspaper" which it said accompanied the actual trial at Flemington.

"We must not have two trials, one in court and one outside," the report said. "The system of the public press arguing the case outside the court is fundamentally wrong."

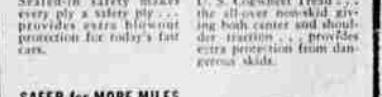
