COUNTIES SEEKING MORE OF GAS TAXES

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Likelihood of the state legislature having to settle the county-state dispute over distribution of funds according from motor vehicle license fees and gasoline taxes loomed strong today.

State and county representatives conferred here yesterday but were unable to reach any agreement.

State representatives, headed by Chairman Henry F. Cabell of the highway commission and H. H. Badcock, highway engineer, asserted that efforts of the state to get federal funds would be crippled if more funds were given the counties. Federal money will be distributed on a matching basis starting next year, they pointed out.

Frank Shull, head of the county association, contended that with highway department revenues increasing, it was only fair that counties receive a larger proportion. He quoted estimates that revenues would be \$8,870,000 this year, more than \$1,000,000 in excess of the 1935 figures.

DEMO CONTROL OF NEXT SESSION SURE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Discussion and death have raised uncertainties in the senatorial situation in several important states, but the democrats nevertheless are fortifying the majority which is certain to be theirs in the next session.

As it stood today, with the re-nomination of Pat Harrison in Mississippi and James F. Byrnes in South Carolina, 55 certain to sit in January are listed democrats. A majority is 49.

Barrying a break in the solid south, where most of the democratic nominees are not even opposed, the margin will be larger. The Georgia primary, in which Governor Eugene Talmadge will pit his anti-New Deal strength against Senator Richard B. Russell Jr., comes September 9. In addition, the border states of Tennessee, Kentucky and Oklahoma are among those now represented by democrats which will elect again in November.

States besides Georgia which have yet to select nominees are Colorado, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Mexico and Rhode Island. In New Mexico, two seats are open.

Of the 26 to be filled in all, one is now farmer-labor, twelve republican and the rest democratic.

The death of Governor Floyd B. Olson, who was supporting Roosevelt while running for the senate on the farmer-labor ticket in Minnesota, left a gap which the leaders have yet to fill.

SAYS CANADIANS FAVOR ROOSEVELT

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Canadians are for President Roosevelt declared Alfred L. Marks, barrister and temperance leader of Edmonton, Alberta, in an interview here today.

"Not as an outgrowth of the Canadian-American reciprocal trade treaty, but because we feel that Roosevelt is the spearhead of the rights of the people of the whole world against the vested interests," Marks said.

Marks has spent the past three weeks on this side of the border visiting editors and sounding out political opinion.

Summing up his remarks on the political situation in his own country, he said concerning Premier Abohart, "I think he is headed for the ash can."

"Canadians are still having a depression in the past tense," Marks declared.

"Everywhere people are saying Canada needs action of the Roosevelt type. We admire him because he went right to work on the people's problems, he invited the people into their confidence and kept them informed."

"We are vitally interested in what you do next fall. We feel the rights of the people will be protected if he is elected, and are afraid of what will happen if he is not."

COLUMBIA NET BAN ENJOINED BY COURT

ASTORIA, Aug. 27.—(AP)—State officials succeeded today in advancing the date for hearing of an injunction to prevent a legal closing of salmon fishing on the Columbia river from next Monday to Friday, Aug. 28.

A temporary injunction had been obtained by Columbia river packers, who contended that the closed season would ruin fishermen, already victims of a poor season.

Before shortening the hearing date, M. T. Hoy, master fish warden, and Deputy Attorney General Francis T. Wade made an unsuccessful plea to Judge Guy Boyington for rescinding the injunction on the grounds that it was contrary to law and against public policy.

The court said he felt his stand was well taken.

Although fishermen operated in the river yesterday, despite the fact that legally the closed season began Tuesday, Hoy contended the injunction did not legalize such operations. It merely prevented authorities from interfering with fishing or packing operations, he said.

The warden said fishermen and packers operating would be subject to arrest if the injunction were vacated. G. C. Fulton, attorney for fishing interests, disputed Hoy's contention, asserting that "even if the order is wrong" the fishermen could not be charged with a crime when they assumed the order was right.
