PAUL DEAN QUILTS GAME FOR 1936. ST. LOUIS, Aug. 28.—(AP)—The "one and Paul" pitching combination is disrupted temporarily. Paul, younger brother of the famed Jerome Hornum pitcher, Dean, has been virtually of no value to the new-entrancing Cardinals since an early spring shoulder injury and he planned to waive some Citizens' League rights to be released by the Cardinals to be placed on the voluntary retired list for the balance of the year.

It was also announced he would receive his salary in full retroactively for the present season with his future salary to be considered when the time arrives to discuss next year's contract. Paul came to the Cards in 1932 from Columbus after Dizzy had carried out his promise of quick game as strikeout king. With Dizzy gone the talking and Paul acting as the "silent partner," the pair eventually became headlines.

OREGONIANS BUY DROUGHT AREA COWS. SALEM, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Approximately 1,000 feeder cows, originating in the drought areas of western Montana and Wyoming, already have been brought into Oregon this year. Dr. W. H. Lytle, head of the Oregon livestock division of the state agricultural department reported today.

Lytle said most of these cattle were purchased outright by Oregon feeders at prices considerably below the normal quotations of previous years. A large percentage of these cattle are being moved to Elsieville and Lake counties and will be placed on the market later in the year.

All cattle purchased in the drought areas and shipped into Oregon must undergo the Bangs disease examination either at the point of origin or upon reaching the Oregon boundary.

Lytle said the recent emergency freight rates announced by the railroads had stimulated the shipment of Oregon hay into the drought areas. The freight rate, under the new tariff, is \$8.50 a ton as against \$13.50 under the old schedule.
