

TOWNSENDERS GET BUSY FOR BATTLE

Vigorous Campaign Will Be Waged in California to Elect Adherents.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 27.—(AP)—California Townsends, who endorsed 11 successful congressional candidates in Tuesday's primary election, drew plans today for backing the nominees in their campaigns.

Eight of the nominees were incumbents and the other three, Nelson Van Matre, Harry B. Sheppard and Ed P. Sample, were newcomers to the congressional field.

E. J. Margett, state manager of the pension plan organization, said his group would put "workers, speakers and money" at the disposal of Townsends endorsed candidates, and predicted 17 of 20 representatives to be elected in November would have Townsends approval.

Frank Arbuckle, western regional Townsends director, made an unsuccessful bid for nomination in the sixteenth congressional district. Rep. John Dockweiler, the incumbent, piled up three times as many votes for the democratic nomination, and about the same number as Arbuckle on the republican ticket where the nomination was easily won by Raymond Darcy, mayor of Inglewood.

Two of the new Townsends candidates won nomination over incumbents. Van Matre took the republican nomination in the first district over the veteran Rep. Clarence F. Lea, who usually was nominated by his own democratic party. Sheppard won the democratic nomination in the 19th district over Rep. Sam L. Collins, who was renominated as a republican.

Sample captured the republican nomination in the 20th district in which there was no incumbent.

How They Line Up

Here are the incumbents who were renominated: Republicans—Harry L. Englebright, 2nd; Florence P. Kahn, 1st; Richard J. Welch, 5th; Albert E. Carter, 6th; D. W. Gearhart, 9th; Sam L. Collins, 19th.

Democrats: Clarence F. Lea, 1st; Frank H. Buck, 3rd; J. H. Toland, 7th; J. J. McGrath, 8th; H. E. Stubbs, 10th; J. C. McGowan, 11th; Charles Kramer, 12th; Thomas F. Ford, 14th; J. M. Costello, 15th; J. F. Dockweiler, 16th; D. N. Scott, 18th.

In the seventeenth district, Rep. Charles Colden appeared to have been renominated over Townsends L. E. Geyer. The count in 417 of 418 precincts was Colden, 15,105; Geyer, 15,132.

The following republican incumbents had Townsends endorsements: Englebright, Welch, Carter, Gearhart.

The following democrats had Townsends backing: Toland, McGrath, Stubbs, Kramer.

CHICAGO, Aug. 27.—(AP)—Townsends national headquarters claimed a voting strength today of nearly 3,000,000 in eight states.

Gilmour Young, national secretary of the Townsends recovery plan of old age revealing pensions, said in a statement:

"Tuesday's primary results in California are indicative of the Townsends strength and I have no doubt we will poll between 800,000 to 1,000,000 votes in the fall elections."

Young said the Townsends strength in Washington and Oregon was proportionately higher than in California, estimating the group's voting power at about 700,000 in each of the two former states.
