TULE LAKE LEASE PROPOSALS OPENED

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 28.—(AP)—Superintendent H. E. Hayden of the reclamation project here announced opening of competitive bidding for the government's rich Tule lake lease grounds.

Hot competition is foreseen for land in the fertile area, now in the midst of a devastating flood. With no preference rights existing on present leases, it is expected that present holders will bid strongly to retain their holdings.

When the present leases were made in 1931, 56,800 acres were leased for a total of \$65,500. The maximum bid per acre was slightly under \$6, far under the maximum expected this year.

Hazden disclosed that about 3,500 acres will be retired from production when the new leases are made. Irrigation of land in the Kopeck bay region will slightly increase actual farmed acreage on the lake, however.

BOSTON, Aug. 29.—The Com. Mercantile Bulletin today says: "The wool market is rather stronger again this week on fair demand, although prices are little or no higher and any advance or attempt at advance is met with stiff resistance still."

"Openings of men's wear lines in the piecegoods markets evoke interest but men's wear lines of overcoats and suitings have been somewhat overproduced and current sales given evidence of this fact. Women's wear lines and knit goods move moderately well."

"Foreign markets are all focused on the opening of the new Australian season in Sydney Monday, where prices are expected to rule firm. European markets are steady."

"Western operations have been scattered but are at firm rates. Mohair is again a shade against the buyer, with some further contracting of the fall clip at around 55 cents for adult hair."

CHINESE PIRATES LOOT AND MURDER

TIENTSIN, Aug. 28.—(AP)—Authorities were balked by a watery trail today in their investigation of the latest daring coup of sea brigands who have plundered the China seas for centuries.

The pirates, employing a time-worn but effective ruse, impersonated passengers when they boarded the ferry steamer Liba before it sailed yesterday from Tientsin.

While the ship was on its way here across the Bay of Chihli they held up and robbed 100 Chinese passengers, seized 32 of them as hostages and escaped to sea in a waiting junk.

The brigands made off with all possessions of those aboard the steamer including their clothes. Panic broke out among the victims, the ship's officers said, and the pirates threw two overboard and shot a third.

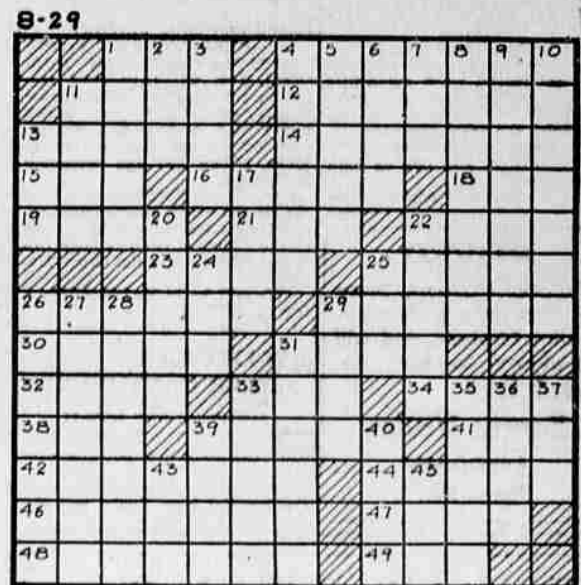
