FAVORITE RECIPES

GRAPE JELLY Mrs. THOS. M. WINNIFORD Steam, wash and drain thoroughly 2 quarts Concord grapes. Place grapes in preserving kettle and crush—then boil for 25 minutes; strain and allow juice to cool to lukewarm stage. Then measure juice, add 1 cup sugar for each cup of juice, and stir until sugar is dissolved. Pour into jelly glasses and let set 24 hours, then seal with paraffin. (Do not cook after sugar is added.)

CARROT SALAD MISS BERYL BRANAM Myrtle Creek, Ore. 4 carrots, grated 2 large tomatoes, diced 1 onion, sliced Salt and pepper Mayonnaise Lettuce Method Fold together the grated carrots, the diced onion and tomatoes. Mix with mayonnaise and season with salt and pepper to taste. Serve on lettuce leaves.

COURT TEST OF NEW FARM ACT ADVISED PORTLAND, Aug. 31.—(AP)—A test of Oregon's agricultural marketing act should be sought in the courts by Sola T. White, state director of agriculture, Morton Tompkins, chairman of the legislative committee of the state grange, asserted today.

The act, passed to take the place of the Oregon AAA, declared unconstitutional, should be subjected to court review to definitely establish the rights of agriculture to get cost production and any "shying away" from a test "cannot be condoned by the grange," Tompkins said.

White said he would make the law operative if the farmers mentioned him to act, but he said he knew of no demand at present for application of it.
