DIET OF FISHMEAL AIDS ALASKA COWS

FAIRBANKS, Alaska.—Every day is Friday to University Farm milk cows on which Supt. Joseph T. Flakne is experimenting with a fish meal diet.

His preliminary report recommending more thorough and extensive tests, said experiments so far with half a ton of Prince William Sound fishmeal, commonly used as fertilizer, were "very satisfactory" and tend to prove that "fishmeal would be a very helpful addition to any dairy or stock feeding ration."

He said milk flow increased but there was little change in butterfat production, under fishmeal tests. It gave no appreciable odor or fishy flavor to the milk.

A very satisfactory balanced feed seemed to be all the mixed hay each animal would clean up, plus a grain mixture in proportion to the amount of milk given by each cow. Our experience was that at first the cows would not eat the fishmeal, but that most of the cows acquired a taste for it and several of them will eat the pure fishmeal by itself.

Flakne's grain mixture contains 100 pounds of ground oats, 100 pounds of ground barley, 20 pounds of linseed meal and 20 pounds of fishmeal.

It was fed before and after milking and increased milk production 5 to 10 per cent, he reported.

OREGON HONEY CROP FACES GOOD YEAR

CORVALLIS.—Information from various sources indicates that the 1936 crop of Oregon honey is about normal in most sections, says H. A. Scullen, associate professor of entomology at O. S. C., while eastern states report honey crops far below normal in most sections. With business conditions gradually coming back to normal, Professor Scullen believes it is reasonable to expect a much stronger demand for honey this coming year.

BENT GRASS FOUND HARDY, PROFITABLE

GOLD BEACH.—The palatability of highland bent grass, as well as its ability to maintain itself under adverse conditions the first year, was demonstrated this year on the farm of Walton Miller of Wedderburn who slashed 12 acres last fall seeded it to bent grass alder, County Agent R. M. Knox, who visited this project recently, found that a very good stand of grass was obtained, even though sheep ranged the entire area and had eaten the bent grass almost under the ground, leaving other typical range grasses to go to seed.
