VARIETY SALAD

1 head of lettuce
1 can sliced pineapple
Small jar mayonnaise
1 large pomegranate
1 cup cottage cheese
1 cup diced apple
Paprika

On each salad plate make a base of shredded lettuce. On this a slice of pineapple. Remove the seeds and pulp from the pomegranate and mix this with the diced apple. At intervals around the pineapple place liberal amounts of cottage cheese with a dash of paprika, mayonnaise, the apple-pomegranate mixture.

You may add a touch of color as well as flavor when tomatoes are in season by placing several small red cherry tomatoes on the plate.

This can be made of the peel and cores of apples used to make apple sauce. Cook with cold water and let them boil until very soft, then strain and measure. Boil 3 cups of juice briskly for 10 min. Add 4 cups of sugar and boil until sugar is dissolved. Pour into sterilized glasses.

Variation: Apple and Rhubarb Jelly—Use Duchin apples and rhubarb, any proportion. Proceed as above.—Mrs. W. L. Scott, Roseburg.
