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FISHERMEN AND CANNERS AT ODDS

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 11.—(AP)—Salmon apparently will be unobscured this fall as far as commercial fishermen are concerned.

Opening of the season found no boats in the Columbia river and, instead, brought an announcement from the Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union that the packers' offer of 2 cents a pound would not be accepted.

The announcement was followed immediately with a statement from the packers that they would shut down their plants.

One packer offered to pay 3 cents a pound but fishermen said it would not be feasible to fish for only one plant. The fishermen originally asked 5 cents a pound for "brights" and 2 cents for discolored fish.

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36 MILLION SPENT IN OREGON BY WPA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 11.—(AP)—The works progress administration said in a report today expenditures in Oregon under the 1935 and 1936 emergency relief acts reached a total of \$36,475,555 on July 31, 1936.

The 1935 act made available \$880,000,000 and the 1936 act \$1,425,000,000 for the nation-wide relief programs.

Presidential allocations to Oregon under both acts totaled \$49,995,567. Obligations incurred amounted to \$46,325,045 which, less actual expenditures, left \$9,849,490 in obligated funds allocated for expenditure in Oregon after July 31.

Of these funds the WPA spent \$10,297,133. Allocations to strictly WPA projects amounted to \$12,723,216, and obligations incurred, \$13,159,744.

The remaining funds were allotted to, obligated or spent by other federal agencies.

Allocations to the Oregon WPA under the 1935 act amounted to \$2,559,375.

Federal relief payrolls, exclusive of administrative employees, showed persons employed during the week ended July 25, totaled 24,982 in Oregon, of which 12,988 were employed on WPA projects, 2,358 on emergency conservation work, and 8,556 by other federal agencies.

The total for the week ended July 11 was 25,782, and for the week ended June 27 it was 27,297.

Of the 8,556 employed the week of July 25 by other agencies, 4,472 were working for the agriculture department as follows: Entomology and plant quarantine, 264; forest service, 85; public roads, 3,975; soil conservation, 73.

The next biggest employer among agencies other than the WPA was the public works administration with a payroll of 2,240, all working on non-federal projects.

U. S. POLITICAL OBSERVATIONS

Viewed from whatever angle, Governor Landon's Buffalo speech on taxation and spending was bound to attract sharper attention than any other speech he has made since his nomination.

It was the financial end of his administration in Kansas which he brought Mr. Landon into the national spotlight.

A dispute has arisen as to what part he himself had in balancing the state budget.

There is no denial that this is a subject with which he has had experience, and to which he has given much thought. It was to be expected that in speaking about public finance he would be at his best.

True to this expectation, the governor put into his Buffalo address a simplicity of expression and a crispness of phrase which has been notably lacking in some of his other public utterances. As a speech, regardless of the soundness and general value of the views expressed, it was recognized in political circles as out of the class of the addresses which had preceded it.

Of course there is no agreement between friend and foe as to the worth of what he said, but his manner of saying it was accepted widely as reflecting a distinct pickup in the vigor of his attack on the new deal.

Governor Names Names

Except for the "gold telegram" which was written before he was nominated, Buffalo marked the first instance in which the republican candidate has stepped out to make a definite pledge of what he will do if elected.

Whereas the platform merely "talked around" the corporation surplus tax law which he has mentioned by name, Mr. Landon went to the subject in this specific fashion:

"This is the most cockeyed piece of tax legislation ever imposed in

a modern country, and if I am elected I shall recommend the immediate repeal of this vicious method of taxation."

Here, then, is a specific issue upon which a categorical difference of view may be developed—a thing very rare thus far in the campaign. President Roosevelt recommended the taxation of corporation surplus, and he signed the law, although after many compromises it did not turn out to the satisfaction of anyone.

It is somewhat of a pity that, as this discussion proceeds, the point must be argued on a theoretical basis only. Neither side will be able to present data based on experience, for although the new law applies to income for the current year, payments into the treasury, by which results can be judged, do not begin until 1937.

Hits At Morgenthau

In a second and still more interesting respect, also, the Buffalo speech saw Governor Landon's campaign enter upon a more outspoken phase.

His stroke at the administration's recent no-new-tax pronouncement was wrapped up in the form of a question: How can anyone really believe this, in the face of the record of the present administration?

It will be observed that the republican nominee did not exactly and directly accuse Secretary Morgenthau, who said a new tax would be "necessary" of telling a wilful untruth. Yet the hearer was left to apply his own implications. Certainly the least that can be said is that the language used by Mr. Landon was not very complimentary.

The same can be said of the democratic retort, so that it appears the campaign may really be warming up at last. Administration spokesmen did not overlook the fact that, beyond the pledge against the surplus tax and a hint that in come taxes should be higher, the republican nominee failed to say in detail what he would do about taxes, what his policy would be about relief spending and how he would balance the budget.

On that front ("What would you do, Mr. Landon?") the democratic shock troops are preparing for action. If Mr. Landon finishes the campaign without answering it, it won't be because he isn't asked.
