CRAMER OPPOSES
STATE BANK PLAN

McMINNVILLE, Ore., Sept. 15.—(AP)—T. P. Cramer, secretary of the Oregon Bankers' association, told a civic club here that "not one cent of (Oregon) state funds was lost through bank closings during the years of the depression."

He urged defeat of the proposed state-owned banking program, said "every state system of state-owned banks has failed," contending that a state-owned bank could not qualify for federal deposit insurance, and said "existing banks, which are put to much extra expense and time in handling public funds, are not the ones which would suffer from the establishment of state-owned banking in Oregon."

FAMOUS SCHOLAR
VISITS CAPUCHINS

The Capuchin Fathers in Oregon are welcoming one of their distinguished colleagues from Ireland, Very Rev. Dr. James. He has been deputized by Rome to conduct the Triennial Visitation of the Capuchin community. He occupies a distinguished place among eminent European scholars. A prominent literary review writes of him: "It has been said that not more than four metaphysicians are born into any century, and undoubtedly Father James, O. M. Cap., is one of the few that the twentieth century has produced. His writings influence the metaphysicians of the world, and cause world-wide repercussions amongst students of philosophy."

"Graduating as Master of Arts, Father James won a traveling studentship from the National university of Ireland which he utilized at the Gregorian university of Rome, proceeding to Louvain, he graduated as doctor of philosophy, and won a fellowship at that distinguished seat of learning. Doctor in literature, he is a prolific writer. His best known works are 'The Desire of God in the Philosophy of St. Thomas,' 'Where is Thy God? The Franciscans,' 'The Sacrament of Life,' 'Life and Religion,' 'The Romanticism of Holiness,' 'The Challenge of Christ.'"

He is in great demand as preacher and lecturer. His series of lectures at Cambridge, St. Edmund's, Ware, Aquinas society, London, and at the Teachers' Congress of England spread his fame outside Ireland, and his radio addresses engaged widespread attention and discussion among Catholics as well as non-Catholics.

Accompanying Dr. James as superior of all the Irish Capuchins in America is the Very Rev. Fr. Joseph Fenelon, Custos General and Pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic church, Roseburg, Oregon.
