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HOLDING COMPANY ACT FACES TEST

Company Which Refused to Register Defendant in Federal Action.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—(AP)—The first major test to determine the constitutionality of the holding company act got under way yesterday as the securities and exchange commission filed its brief against the Electric Bond and Share company in the southern district federal court in New York.

This company, which serves 10 per cent of the total electric customers in the United States, was one of the firms which declined to register under the holding company act, declaring the statute unconstitutional. Suit to compel it to register was brought by the commission last November.

The company based its refusal to register on the ground it would be "irreparably injured." This the commission denied its brief today and asked the court to restrain it from acting in interstate commerce because it has violated the law in refusing to register.

The commission's brief charged the Electric Bond and Share company with "unclean hands."

"Defendants have unclean hands because their prayer for affirmative relief is predicated on the fact that they have refused, without legal justification, to register," one section of the brief stated.

"Defendants have unclean hands because of their representations to the congress," another section read, referring to the testimony before the house committee by S. R. Inch, president of Electric Bond and Share when, the brief alleged, he declared "we are not opposed to any proper regulation which may be necessary for the protection of either investors or rate payers."

Finally, the brief declared the defendants "have failed to prove that they have been damaged, irreparably or otherwise, either by the act or by any action or threat of action by the plaintiff or by any cross defendant and, therefore, are not entitled to relief in equity."

Lone Issue Cited.

The brief reminded the court that the only issue before it was the validity of sections 4 (a) and 5 of the act as applied to defendants. These sections state that where a holding company maintains its control over subsidiaries and carries on its business through federal channels of communication or commerce, the controlling company must register.

The commission noted that although the process of registration puts no burden upon the Electric Bond and Share, and "waives, impairs, or prejudices none of their rights to set up at any time the unconstitutionality of any provision of the act or the invalidity of any rule, regulation or order thereunder as applied to them, the defendants have refused to file a simple notification of registration as required by the act."

In this, they have been joined by many others. Commission officials today estimated that only one tenth of the industry had registered, withholding, they said, until the constitutionality of the act had been determined.

Eighteen Douglas county 4-H club members sent exhibits to the state fair, according to a report by E. A. Britton, club agent. These exhibits covered forestry, clothing, livestock, cooking and canning.

Albert Marsh of Glenary won first place on a forestry exhibit which, according to the judges excelled to considerable degree any of the fine exhibits which were on hand.

Josephine Wright of Days Creek placed second in the "Ball Special" canning contest and eighth on her exhibit in the second division canning. Marjorie Wright, a sister to Josephine, placed third with her exhibit of White Pekin ducks.

James Paulsen of Azalea sent in a fine exhibit of "handicraft" which included six articles made of wood, and won third place on his exhibit.

Nell favorable comment was made by Miss Helen Cowgill, assistant state club leader in charge of home economics, and the judges of clothing, on the clothing exhibits sent in by Douglas county girls who are handicapped by the fact that the upstate girls are privileged to see a large number of style revues and clothing demonstrations and are in constant contact with outstanding clothing work. This is a distinct advantage over girls from southern and eastern Oregon.

The club members who sent in these exhibits were all instructed to take advantage of this opportunity and gain all the knowledge possible by comparing their exhibits with those of others, and while they may not win ribbons or money they were still far ahead in knowledge and besides they have done their bit toward contributing to what is reported to be the best state fair Oregon has ever held.

4-H GETS FUND FOR RAISING PHEASANTS

The county club agent, E. A. Britton, Tuesday received a check from the Oregon state game commission for \$17.75 to be distributed among the 4-H club members who raised China pheasants for the game commission this year.

Those who completed their projects and turned their birds back to the commission are: James Nichols of Riddle, 53 birds, \$39.56; James Manley, Canyonville, 17 birds, \$12.75; John Anna, 29 birds, \$15; Wilbur White, Canyonville, 19 birds, \$14.25; Marjory Wright, 7 birds, \$5.25; Don Wright, 37 birds, \$27.75; James Raser, 15 birds, \$11.25; Philip Branson, 6 birds, \$4.50; Charles Church, 4 birds, \$3.00; Bertram Shoemaker, 17 birds, \$12.75; Lucia Britton, 34 birds, \$25.50.

A total of 229 birds was produced by this club of eleven members. It is expected that this project will be open to club members another year. If the recommendation as submitted by the county club agent and Heekitt Baker who led this club in the project is accepted, the club members may carry on this project at less expense than did these members this year.

However, a good profit was made by most, if not all, of the members. One girl with 34 birds had a feed expense of \$6.50, and one boy with 3 birds had a feed expense of \$6.50. Another with 32 birds spent \$7.65 and still another with 33 birds spent only \$2.60. This member, however, had a lot of green feed at home. They received 75 cents each for the birds.

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
