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FARM INCOME OF OREGON INCREASES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—(AP)

The agriculture department estimated today Oregon farmers' cash income, exclusive of benefit payments, amounted to \$59,259,000 in 1935, compared with \$74,453,000 in 1934, a gain of about 20 per cent.

The department estimated the cash income for farmers of the nation at \$6,705,823,000 for 1935 and \$5,630,237,000 for 1934, exclusive of benefit payments.

The department's report showed these statistics for Oregon:

and the highest in six years. The cash income represented the value of products actually sold off the farm where they were produced.

The gross income of Oregon farmers, including cash income plus the value of products consumed on the farm by the producers, increased from \$82,746,000 in 1934 to \$99,806,000 in 1935.

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AMELIA PONDER'S WORLD AIR TRIP

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 16.—(AP) Amelia Earhart, who simply won't stay down to earth, is "nearly sold" on the idea of going around it—by airplane, of course.

"I'd like to fly around the world," she said, "but I'm a busy person this year. There are other things to do. Next year? Well, one never knows."

In October she starts a six-weeks' lecture tour through the midwest—daily talks on women's achievements in the air.

In November she will bring back here her "flying laboratory"—a new \$75,000 Lockheed monoplane—which she is taking to Purdue university, Lafayette, Ind., this Saturday. Tests will follow, sponsored by the Purdue research foundation.

The woman who flew over both the Atlantic and Pacific said she had cast herself as a "human guinea pig" for these future studies of the stresses and strains affecting aviation's human element.

"They've tested airplane parts for years," she said, "I think it's time they got around to the pilot and passenger, don't you?"

The experiments are slated to include long-distance flights, since engineers say her Purdue-financed plane can go 4,500 miles non-stop.

Four 4,500-mile hops in succession would carry Amelia Earhart farther than Wiley Post's skytrial around the globe.

"I know that," she said, "just talking about it nearly cures me the blues. But I'm not sure I have no definite plans yet."

"I'm only certain that I'd like to."

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FRESHMAN WEEK DATED AT U. OF O.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Sept. 16.—Everything will be in readiness by the end of this week for new and old students who are expected to be on the campus in full force by the time "freshman week" officially opens Monday, September 21, it was announced here by Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, university president.

Preparations are under way to take care of approximately 3,000 students, although a larger number can find places should they come, it is stated. This figure is based on the expected increase of about eight per cent throughout the system of higher education in Oregon.

During the week all students will be required to take a physical examination, a psychological examination, English examination, confer with advisors, be photographed and then complete registration. A carefully drawn up schedule has been sent to every student who has qualified for admittance and this is expected to be followed during the week.

Besides giving the student plenty of time to choose courses before actual classes start, "freshman week" will also provide opportunity to get a first hand view of university life. The first freshman assembly will be held Monday evening, at 8 p. m., in the music auditorium. Dr. Boyer will outline to the students the general plans for the year, other phases of university procedure will be described by the dean of men and dean of women, and student leaders will describe their side of life on the campus.

Various groups interested in the religious aspects of student life will hold open house during the freshman week, and Friday evening, October 2, has been set aside as church night, when these groups will be hosts to the newcomers.

New students when arriving on the campus should call immediately at the dean of men's or women's office and register their address. They will then be instructed where to go for the rest of their appointments during the week.

TOWNSENDERS OF MARION NOMINATE

SALEM, Sept. 6.—(AP)—Townsend supporters, 275 strong, nominated two candidates of their own for the state legislature from Marion county last night and their names will appear on the ballot as independents.

O. A. Olson and R. A. Harris, both of Salem, were placed in nomination. S. B. Mills of Salem, and W. H. Potter of Silverton, democratic nominees for the other two seats, received the endorsement of the assembly.

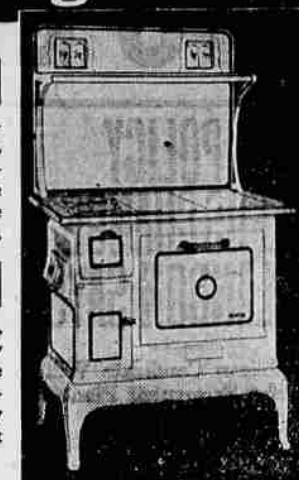
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
