SPECIAL LIMESTONE BUYING RATE OPEN

Benefits at the rate of \$2 an acre are available to farmers for applying limestone at the rate of one ton per acre under the 1936 agricultural conservation program, states County Agent J. Roland Parker, October 31, however, is the last day that limestone may be applied and benefits claimed. Arrangements have been made by the county agent's office to pool orders for ground agricultural limestone to make a substantial saving to farmers and to secure immediate delivery in car load lots. Ground limestone in paper sacks delivered in car load lots will cost farmers \$7 a ton at the car door; in bulk limestone will be \$6 a ton. The quality of limestone available is guaranteed to test 97 per cent or better calcium carbonate. Farmers planning on seeding alfalfa next spring could well afford to apply limestone this fall where needed, as better results are secured from fall applications. In most cases, than when applied just previous to seeding alfalfa or clover. Pooling orders to secure limestone in carload lots will enable farmers to secure their supplies at a lower figure than for many years and should encourage the planting of more alfalfa. Orders for ground limestone should be left at the county agent's office, states Mr. Parker, as soon as possible to insure receiving cars in time to make applications previous to October 31, the dead line for benefits under the 1936 agricultural conservation program. 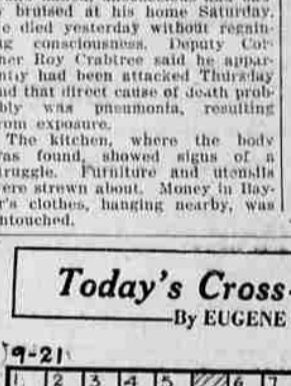

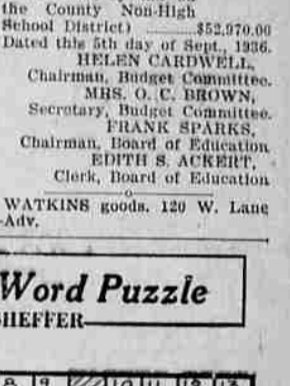
