Medium size dish cold boiled potatoes, cut fine

1 onion, cut fine

2 hardboiled eggs, cut fine

And add as much dressing as desired.

Salad Dressing
1/2 cup vinegar (not too strong)
1/2 cup sugar
Pinch salt

Put on fire and bring to boil, then turn over 1 beaten egg to which has been added 1 rounded tablespoon cornstarch and 1 small rounded teaspoon dry mustard, beating continuously. Return to fire and let boil, stirring well to prevent lumping or sticking. This dressing will be very thick. Add 1/2 cup sweet cream before using.

Dressing will keep for days if cream has not been added.

PRUNE WHIP
3 c cooked Oregon prunes; 4 slices pineapple; 1 c combined prune and pineapple juice; 1 T granulated gelatin; 18 marshmallows; 1/2 pt whipping cream; 1 T vanilla. Pit prunes and cut into pieces. Cut pineapple into pieces. Soften gelatin in 1/2 c of the fruit juice; heat remaining juice to boiling and dissolve softened gelatin in it. Cut marshmallows in pieces; whip cream; when the gelatin begins to set, combine with other ingredients, blending thoroughly. Chill and serve in glasses. Serves 6.

FISH BILL FIGHT CARRIED HIGHER

SALEM, Sept. 22.—(AP)—Attorneys seeking an injunction to keep the anti-Columbia river fish bill off the ballot presented final arguments to the state supreme court today in an appeal from the decree of Judge Arlie G. Walker which previously denied the injunction.

The action was brought by Attorneys Jay Bowerman, W. S. U'ren and Roscoe Krier, through District Attorney W. H. Trindle of Marion county, alleging false presentation in obtaining names to the initiative petitions.

Judge Walker held that while some names may have been obtained in this manner the sufficiency of legal voters on the petitions validated the petitions.

The measure under attack, if passed in November, would prohibit use of seines and traps in the Columbia river for salmon fishing. This bill has been bitterly fought in the courts during the past few weeks.

An opinion was expected by the court either late tomorrow or Thursday. The final date of the secretary of state's certification of measures for the ballot is September 25.
