

IDENTICAL PAINS SUFFERED BY TWINS

PATRICROFT, Eng., Sept. 22.—(AP)—Symptomatic twins—who suffer identical pains when only one of them is ill or injured—were under observation by British physicians today.

They are William and Thomas Stockie, 5-year-olds. Thomas is now in the Royal Manchester hospital where doctors are working to save his left eye, which was injured while playing.

Shortly after the accident William's eye began to swell. At first doctors were puzzled as to why, but today William, recovering, said a playmate had tripped a matchstick in his eye.

That didn't explain other coincidental maladies of the Stockie twins.

The mother told physicians the same thing has happened many times since the twins were born.

"When anything goes wrong with one of them, it always happens to the other, too," she asserted.

"A short time ago one of them was in the house and she complained of an earache. A few minutes later the other twin, who had been outdoors playing and had not seen or spoken to his brother for hours, came in to complain of earache."

"We know they don't plot them, because on several occasions they have not been near each other all day. It was just the same when they were too young to plot anything."

Local doctors said they had heard of similar instances but declined to comment on the Stockie case pending further study.

SPUDS CARRY WILT TO RASPBERRIES

If you are planning on setting out a patch of black raspberries, make sure that you do not put it on soil where potatoes have been grown within the past three years. If you do you may expect to suffer up to 100 per cent loss from verticillium wilt, says Dr. S. M. Zeller, plant pathologist at the Oregon State college experiment station, in a new research bulletin just issued dealing with this disease of cane fruits.

This is not the only step necessary in protecting black raspberry plantings in this state, but it is one of the more important ones, he says. Other carriers of this fungus disease besides potatoes are tomatoes, egg plant, pig weed and groundsel, according to his experiments that have continued over a period of more than seven years.

Dr. Zeller found that where black raspberries have followed potatoes or a similarly susceptible crop, 50 per cent or more of the plants have been infected, while in a number of cases the commercial value of large plantings has been completely destroyed by this disease. The Cultured red raspberry, the Evergreen, Himalaya, Lawton and the wild northwestern trailing blackberries have been found to be highly resistant to the disease.

Three rules for avoiding losses from this disease, given by Dr. Zeller, are to rotate infected plants if less than 5 per cent show the disease, rotate crops to rid the soil of wilt contamination, and use planting stock only from nurseries or other plantings that are free from wilt.

OREGON PEPPERMINT OUTPUT DECREASES

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—The agriculture department forecast today production of peppermint and spearmint oil in Oregon this year would be 4,000 pounds less than in 1935.

Oregon was listed as one of five states producing those oils. The department estimated a 1936 production of 630,000 pounds for the five states, compared with 1,393,000 pounds in 1935, a decrease of 54 per cent.

Acreage was reported at 28,900, compared with 42,350 acres last year, a drop of 32 per cent. Oregon's acreage was estimated at 1,500, compared with 1,600 last year. The yield per acre in Oregon was estimated at 49 pounds, the same as last year.

CUBAN EXPORTS TO U. S. SHOW GAIN

WASHINGTON, Sept. 21.—(AP)—Increased Cuban exports of fresh fruits and vegetables to the United States are reported by the commerce department.

Shipments of fresh vegetables from Cuba to the United States in the first eight months of this year amounted to 64,348,595 pounds, compared to 53,921,115 in the corresponding period of 1935. Of tomatoes alone Cuba shipped 38,428,956 pounds to the United States in the first eight months of 1936, against 35,366,000 pounds last year.
