VEAL SALAD WITH HORSE-RADISH DRESSING

MRS. HUGH WHIPPLE
Roseburg, Ore.
2 T. gelatin dissolved in ¼ cup cold water
¼ c. boiling water
¼ c. vinegar or 2 T. lemon juice
¼ c. sugar
1 T. salt, celery salt, onion salt
1 small can pimiento
2 hard-boiled eggs, chopped
2 finely chopped nuts
2 c. cooked ground lean veal
Mix thoroughly and mound.
The Dressing
1 T. vinegar
2 T. horseradish
1 T. dry mustard
½ t. salt
3 large T. mayonnaise
1 c. whipped cream
Dash of red pepper.

PRUNE UPSIDE DOWN CAKE

For bottom: 4 T. melted butter; ½ c. brown sugar; ½ c. nut meats; 1 t. cinnamon; 1½ c. cooked prunes. Mix sugar and cinnamon and sprinkle over melted butter in bottom of heavy skillet. Pit prunes and place nut meat in center. Place prunes with nut meats down on top of sugar in skillet. Let stand while mixing batter. Batter: ½ c. butter or other shortening; 1 c. granulated sugar; 2 eggs, beaten; ¼ c. prune juice from cooked prunes; 1¼ c. all-purpose flour; ½ t. salt; 2 t. baking powder; 1 t. vanilla. Cream butter, add sugar and cream well. Add well beaten eggs and mix thoroughly. Add prune juice alternately with flour which has been sifted with salt and baking powder. Add vanilla and beat well. Pour batter over all and bake for 30 min. or until done in a moderate oven. Turn out of skillet while hot. Serve in wedges garnished with whipped cream. Serves 10.

CHEWING TAFFY

WILMA ELLISON, Iuya Creek.
2 c. sugar; 1 c. water, when it boils add 2 T. vinegar and butter slice of walnut. Cook until hardens when dropped into cold water. Add flavoring if desired. Pour into a buttered plate. Pull when cool enough.

CREAMY FUDGE

2 cups sugar
2 cup cream
2 dessert spoons light Karo syrup
2 dessert spoons ground chocolate.
Stir until well dissolved—wash down crystals from sides of kettle, boil slowly until it forms a soft ball when dropped into cold water. When taken from stove, add one tablespoon butter, one teaspoon vanilla. Let cool until lukewarm, beat till creamy, pour into buttered pans.

YOUTH ENROLLMENT IN CCC EXPLAINED

Sons in families certified for employment on federal work programs are eligible for CCC enrollment. Franklin Votz, executive secretary of the Douglas county relief committee, announced today. An enrollment of replacements to fill existing vacancies in the civilian conservation corps will be held during the period of October 1 to 15.

The same eligibility requirements will prevail as heretofore. Mr. Votz reports except that honorably discharged juniors will be ineligible for reselection for a period of one year following the date of their discharge. They will then become eligible to apply for reselection, provided former service was not less than four months.

Applicants, Mr. Votz states, should bring birth certificates or discharge papers with them when seeking employment in the CCC. Requirements are that applicants must be: 17 to 25 years of age, inclusive, unmarried, unemployed, physically fit, citizens of the United States, and willing to allot \$25 monthly to dependents of blood or obligation. The applicant must definitely represent a family on the public assistance roll, a family employed by WPA or a family receiving aid from rural resettlement or young men on parole or probation are not eligible.

TOLEDO FALLS INTO HANDS OF REBELS

diers straggled southward, their route to Madrid blocked by insurgent troops and guns.

In a rain of shells and bombs, the relentless columns of General Francisco Franco beat down a waning government defense yesterday and marched into the battered city which once was the capital of Spain.

From the eastern section a shout went up. Ragged, emaciated fascists—besieged, battered and gaunt—emerged from the ruins of the Alcazar where they had withstood dynamite, gasoline and shell bombardments for weeks.

The Alcazar—more than 1,200-year-old fortress—sprung forth its insurgent detachments who joined the battle with trembling shouts of "Viva Espana!"

Delirious with enthusiasm over release from the softening prison to which they fled after government forces dominated sternly the rebellion in Toledo, they charged the defending lines.

Between the withering blasts from before and behind, the last socialist lines scattered and fled. The siege of Toledo, immediate objective in the southern fascist army's march on the capital, was consummated.

Rushing fearfully, the government forces retired southward over Tagus river bridges and into the country beyond. The advance of Franco's columns from the north cut off a possible retreat to the capital.

The insurgent high command announced 300 government men had been killed and many wounded.

GOVERNMENT WARSHIPS SHELL CITY OF BILBAO

BILBAO, Spain, Sept. 28.—Spanish government warships gave this besieged city relief today, halting an insurgent advance with a naval bombardment and conveying food supplies into the harbor.

From off the coast the battleships Jaime and the cruiser Cerastes and Libertad poured shells into Zumaya, headquarters of the fascist attackers.

Naval gunners, handicapped by a rough sea, dropped exploding missiles into the center of the town which ripped buildings apart and started fires.

HUNDREDS FLEEING FLOODS IN TEXAS

WACO, Texas, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Hundreds of lowland families dropped rehabilitation work and fled for their lives again today when central Texas rivers raged again after last week's disastrous floods.

Property loss, estimated at \$5,000,000 after last week's floods, rapidly climbed into additional millions, but loss of life was held to a minimum. Four deaths had been attributed to autumnal rains and record overflows.

Thousands received emergency relief where streams and tributaries swelled, in some sections, flood stages attained during the 1921 flood that took 224 lives in the area.

In Brown and McCulloch counties more than 100 families who had moved back into homes ruined a week ago, fled today as the Colorado river at Winchell, 19 miles south of Brownwood, reached a 56-foot stage at 11 a. m. It continued to rise a foot an hour towards last week's high mark of nearly 60 feet.

Three persons were killed in a collision in blinding rain north of San Marcos and one man was drowned in the Colorado river near Burnet. Another was feared drowned when three automobiles were washed from a road near Ames in the Temple area.

RANGER SHOT IN HUNTING MISTAKE

PENDLETON, Ore., Sept. 28.—(AP)—Arthur Leroy Bray, Umatilla junior clerk at the Frazer ranch station near Tower mountain, was in a hayfield here today, the first victim of the hunting season in Umatilla county.

Bray was shot late yesterday afternoon while on a hunting trip near the ranger station with two companions. A .38-caliber bullet, from the gun of one of the companions, John Edward Butson, Umatilla, passed through both of Bray's thighs without touching a bone or an artery.

Bray's thighs without touching a bone or an artery. The physician announced that the wound was a clean one and that Bray's condition was in no way serious.

Bray declared that he would not press charges against Butson, who admitted firing the shot, declaring that it was intended for a buck deer which he had been trailing through a wooded canyon.
