

World Series Expected to Go 6 Games

YANKS FAVORED ON BAT POWER BASIS

Giants' Hopes Rest Mainly on Pitchers, Headed by Great Carl Hubbell.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Two baseball clubs that were picked to finish third this year in their respective pennant races will start the big money battle tomorrow in the first all-New York series since Babe Ruth and John McGraw ended a spectacular season rivalry in 1921. It will again be the Yankees against the Giants.

The general expectation is that it will take six games to reach a decision, with Yankee power arrayed against a Giant defense that features the great Carl Hubbell.

Whether Manager Joe McCarthy decides to send Vernon (Lefty) Gomez against Hubbell in the opener or shifts to his right-handed ace, Charles Ruffing (Red), the Giants will be favorites to make a victorious start on their own stadium grounds.

The pressure will be on Hubbell, but the Oklahoma master of major league baseball's most baffling delivery has borne up pretty well under the burden thus far. There is less reason to figure that Hubbell will crack under the strain than there is to suppose that the Yankees, a comparatively youthful outfit, will be "pressing" from their anxiety to justify the series odds in their favor.

Picks Nationals
This writer favors the chances of the National league champions for the following reasons: (1) That Hal Schumacher and Freddy Fitzsimmons, with their "downers," will combine with the peerless Hubbell to give the Giants more consistently effective hurling than any three men the Yankees can

HUBBELL SAYS HIS SPEED LESSENED

Giants' Ace Hurler Admits Cold Affects His Arm; Curve Developed.

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Carl Hubbell said today he is not the pitcher now he was in 1933. On the eve of another world series, climaxing the most successful season of his career, he spoke longingly of the time when weather made no difference to his pitching.

Three years ago I wouldn't be wondering what kind of weather we'll have for the opener. Now I like the sunshine," he said.

This was the Hubbell who won 26 games and lost only six this season, who carried and inspired a crippled Giant team through one of the greatest late season drives in recent major league history.

"They're all wrong about me being faster. I had more speed in 1933 and it didn't take long to get them going about where I wanted them. Now when it's cold, I feel the difference."

Hubbell said he has changed his style since he pitched in the 1933 series. Then he relied, he said, almost entirely on his "screwball," a "fade-away" reminiscent of the great Christy Mathewson's favorite pitch, which Hubbell can make drop and curve one way to left handers and another to the right hand swingers.

Perfect Curve.
"But you can't get by in this league on any one pitch," Hubbell continued. "They learned to hit the 'screwball' by standing up in front of the plate and hitting it before it broke. Then I tried to throw them fast ones inside. What I really needed was a curve, but I didn't have one."

For the past two years Hubbell has been working on his curve. "I got in the ball pen quite a lot in 1934 and 1935 and I worked out that curve every chance I got. Now I think I've got a better curve than I ever had. That's why I had a good year."

Hubbell, 33 now, was playing for the Cushing, Okla., team in a class "D" league in 1933 when the Giants and Yankees met last in the world series.

Hubbell said he did not think he could pitch his best without three days rest. He switched the suggestion of some critics that he go to the mound every other day against the Yankees.

"I might get away with it, but I doubt it," he said.

Impeletiere, who stands 6 feet 7 1/2 inches, saved the title bout, after from the outset with a terrific right hand to the jaw, and won at least six of the ten rounds here last night, taking the referee's decision by a convincing margin.

RANGE BUILDING PROGRAM DRAWN

Ranchers and Stockmen of West to Get Payments For Participation.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Benefit payments of \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 for soil conservation practices were forecast today for western ranchers and stockmen under new regulations announced by the agricultural adjustment administration.

Applying to 11 states, the regulations prescribed practices with which stockmen could obtain federal benefit payments ranging from \$50 for development of each spring or seep of water down to rodent control at 7 1/2 cents an acre for killing prairie dogs and 5 cents an acre for killing kangaroo rats.

They constitute the range improvement program which will be administered by the western division of the A.A.A., of which George E. Farwell is director, for the remainder of 1936.

Farwell emphasized that it was a range building and not a cattle or sheep reduction, program. It will apply to all privately owned or privately controlled land, including public lands leased for private operation, and is open to all stockmen in the states concerned.

"Participation by stockmen will be entirely voluntary," Farwell said. Payment rates listed.

The total payments for each ranch, the A.A.A. said, will be limited to an amount equal to 25 multiplied by the grazing capacity of the ranch.

"For example," the announcement said, "if the grazing capacity of a ranch is 500 cattle, the total payment may not exceed \$1,250."

The approved practices, and the rates of payment were:

Contouring, 60 cents an acre.
Developing of springs and seeps, 50 cents each.

Earthen pits or reservoirs for holding rainfall, 15 cents a cubic yard of fill or excavation.
Weirs, \$1 per linear foot of well dug or drilled.

Water spreading, 10 cents per 100 linear feet of permanent ditching.
Reseeding depleted range land, \$2.50 an acre for reseeding with crested wheat grass; \$1.25 an acre for reseeding with slender wheat grass, western wheat grass, or broom grass.

Range fencing, 20 cents a rod.
Rodent control, 7 1/2 cents an infested acre (for prairie dogs, 5 cents an infested acre for kangaroo rats).

Pine guards, 5 cents per 100 linear feet.
Railing sagebrush, 50 cents an acre.

ROSS CANCELS PLAN TO FIGHT CARROLL
CHICAGO, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Barney Ross' proposed defense of his world welterweight championship against Jack Carroll at Sydney, Australia, in December, was canceled today by Manny Sam Pian when Charles Lucas, Australian promoter, called he would be unable to deposit a \$50,000 guarantee and \$7,000 for expenses in a Chicago bank.

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RUFFING TO PITCH OPENER FOR YANKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—(AP)—Joe McCarthy, manager of the New York Yankees, today named Charles (Red) Ruffing, right-handed pitcher, to pitch duty against the New York Giants in the opening game of the world series at the Polo grounds tomorrow.

Carl Hubbell, great southpaw, will pitch for the Giants.

Ending widespread speculation among baseball experts who figured the pilot of the American league champions might be inclined to gamble on his erratic left-hander, Vernon Gomez, in the first game, McCarthy's choice instead fell on the veteran red-head who was by far the most consistent of Yankee pitchers this year.

Terry's announcement that Hubbell would start for the National league pennant-winners surprised no one. There did not appear to be any other possible choice.

Terry indicated that he would send young Hal Schumacher, a right-hander, against the Yankees in the second game and save Fred Fitzsimmons, a veteran, for the third game. McCarthy declined to hazard a guess on his pitching selection beyond the first game.

More depressing even than today's cold rain was the forecast of continued chilly weather and "probable rain" for tomorrow. The temperature today was in the 50's, more suitable for football than baseball.

Commissioner Landis said no postponement would be considered until tomorrow.

The rain compelled both teams to call off their dogs practice.
