2 eggs; 2 c. sugar; 1 c. shortening; 1/2 c. milk; 2 t. baking powder; 1 t. vanilla; flour to handle. Mix all together, roll and cut as usual, place 1 t. of filling on a cookie, then place a cookie on top of this. Bake in quick oven. Filling: 1 c. ground prunes or raisins; 1/2 c. ground nuts; 1/2 c. sugar; 1/2 c. water; 1 T. flour; pinch salt. Roll this all together a few minutes. Bake in moderate oven.
