

LONDON RAPS ORDER ON CIVIL SERVICE

Not Real Step in Line With Merit System, Declares G. O. P. Candidate.

TOPEKA, Kas., Sept. 30.—(AP)—Governor Landon set aside today for more work on speeches he will deliver on a forthcoming tour of lake states.

Last night Mr. Landon aimed criticism at a recent presidential order governing the selection of upper class postmasters.

"The president's recent civil service order proved not to be a real step in the direction of a merit system, but its effect was to freeze the tenure of present jobholders," he told reporters.

Landon's running mate, Col. Frank Knox, carried his campaign into Ohio, which he described as "real fighting ground." He will speak at Cincinnati tonight.

While the nominees thus were active, democrats criticized the Landon stand on social security and republicans struck at President Roosevelt on the ground he is supported by radicals.

John G. Winant, former chairman of the social security board, accused the republican leadership of seeking to substitute a "dependency dolo" for an insurance system. Senator LaFollette (Prog-Wis.) declared there was "glaring misstatements" in Landon's recent criticism of the new deal act.

Republican Chairman John D. M. Hamilton said Earl Browder, communist presidential nominee, was throwing his strength to Mr. Roosevelt, while Robert H. Lucas of Kentucky assailed the democratic administration as "socialistic and un-American."

CINCINNATI—John D. M. Hamilton, republican national committee chairman, was motoring here from Lexington, Ky. George Langley, a Kentucky chief of police, halted the car.

"You're doing 68," he declared, adding something to the effect, "all right, this time, but don't let it happen again."

"Then we told him who we were," Hamilton related afterward. "He said he would punish us by voting for President Roosevelt."

"He," Hamilton continued, "is the finest democrat I ever met."

SYRACUSE, N. Y.—To Thomas H. Dowd, former supreme court justice, was nominated the job of making the nomination speech for Gov. Herbert H. Lehman before the democratic state convention.

Asserted Dowd: "The privilege of presenting the name of Herbert Hoover to this convention as a candidate for governor is indeed a pleasant one."
