MASSACRE OF ELK
STIRS UTAH REGION

SALT LAKE CITY, Sept. 30.—(AP)—An elk massacre—kept secret for months by fear "guerrilla warfare might crop out against the killers"—came to light today with an announcement that information would be laid before a federal grand jury.

Evidence will include motion pictures of 31 dead elk, their crushed bodies in a ghastly pile at the bottom of an 800-foot cliff, United States forest service officials said.

State Game Commissioner Newell B. Cook said charges would be sought against seven stockmen for the alleged stampeding of the animals last December over the cliff on North Horn mountain in Emery county, in wild south central Utah.

Elk which did not leap to their death were shot at the top of the cliff and their bodies left to rot, Cook asserted, adding:

"The purpose of the massacre, the worst game atrocity ever committed in this state, was not to secure meat.

"The motive was much more shameful—to kill animals accused of consuming forage needed by the stockmen.

"But these animals were killed on forest land, on the public grazing domain. Stockmen as well as sportsmen were stunned by the brutal deed. That's why we've kept it secret so long—we didn't want any guerrilla warfare to crop up against the killers."

Information gathered in a nine-month investigation has been placed with T. M. Talbert, forest service attorney, for presentation to a grand jury, Cook said. Penalty for the offense includes a heavy fine and loss of grazing privileges.

OREGON EVENTS

THE DALLES, Sept. 29.—(AP)—The 53rd annual convention of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Oregon got under way here last night. More than 100 delegates were registered.

An address by Mrs. Margaret C. Munns, national treasurer, was a feature of the opening sessions.

TOLEDO, Sept. 30.—Believed to be the victim of a hit-run driver, the body of an Indian woman was found beside the highway north of Depece bay Sunday. Authorities tentatively identified her as Cynthia Willings of Grande Ronde.

LA GRANDE, Sept. 30.—Armed day will be celebrated in traditional manner by the La Grande American Legion post. The high light will be a football game between the Albion, Idaho, and Eastern Oregon Normal schools.

Other posts in northeastern Oregon will be invited to participate in a huge parade.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—Although parties concerned apparently could not agree on what it was all about, two men yesterday started picketing the WPA headquarters here.

"They laid 80 of us off," one of the men said.

"WPA unfair to organized labor—Oregon alliance," the placards read.

WPA officials had no comment to make until the return of A. J. Albright.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—Governor Martin yesterday named D. O. Hood, former director of the state budget, to the Port of Portland commission. He succeeded Phil

Metschan, who brought to a close 18 years of service to devote more time to private business.

Hood's appointment must be confirmed by the legislature's interim committee.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—Portland will hear a presidential candidate on Friday when Norman Thomas, socialist, speaks at the public auditorium.

Thomas, who polled more than 15,000 votes in Oregon in 1932, is expected to discuss the Coughlin-Lemke movement.

The candidate's only other Oregon appearance will be at Corvallis Friday afternoon.

PORTLAND, Sept. 30.—Portland's accident fatalities since last December jumped to 52 yesterday with the death of James Tuttle, 28, of Vancouver, Wash.

Tuttle died from injuries resulting from a crash last Sunday when his motorcycle struck and killed James Muldoon, 52, of Portland. Muldoon was the thirty-third pedestrian death for the fiscal year.

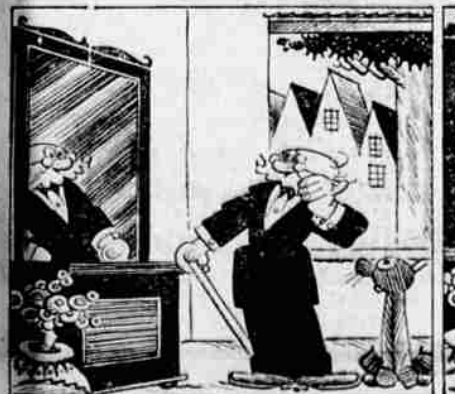
