WILD LIFE PROGRAM CITED BY ROOSEVELT

ELKINS, W. Va., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Stressing conservation of natural resources in his first West Virginia speech, President Roosevelt declared here today there was "a growing consciousness that man's errors in the past must be corrected by man in the future."

Standing in a cold drizzle in a natural amphitheatre of Davis-Elkins college, the president told a mountain state festival crowd that "in the worthwhile effort" of conservation the federal and state governments are "working hand in hand."

He cited many activities of the new deal to conserve wild life and other resources because he declared "critics of the administration have lately been engaged in expressing dissatisfaction with the progress of wild life restoration by the federal government during the past three years."

"We evolved," he said, "a national wild life conservation program which proposed to provide abundantly for the needs of wild life by purchase and retirement of agricultural lands, sub-marginal in character by the purchase of other suitable lands and by making generous allocations of public lands all to be set aside as sanctuaries."

He also cited the migratory bird treaty with Mexico, the duck stamp bill, the coordination bill on game laws and the Robinson bill creating game sanctuaries.

He said he would continue his conservation policies in the "next four years," as the crowd laughed. "No part of our conservation work is more important," he said, "than the protection of our wild life. It is a work into which we can all enter heart and soul, because there is no political partisanship in activity whose object is to preserve and restore the life of our great out of doors."

BIG MILK CONCERNS ACCUSED IN REPORT

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—(AP)—A story of big stick tactics by giant milk concerns to maintain list prices, of rebates to chain stores and of a "manipulation" maneuver in New York whereby certain dairy farmers lost money at the rate of \$250,000 a year was told today in a federal trade commission report.

The commission also said it found evidence of price agreements among big firms and that the Borden company, one of the largest, "at times refrained from competing" with other companies.

The report dealt with conditions in the vast New York milk shed, and discussed nationwide milk products concerns which have headquarters in New York City.

It was prepared in response to a congressional mandate to determine whether any concern is tending toward monopoly, competing unfairly, or depressing the prices dairy farmers receive.

Two huge concerns, the Borden company and National Dairy Products corporation, were named as maintaining resale prices on their products. The Borden company, it was said, in some cases threatened to cut off supplies to distributors who sold for less than list prices. Kraft-Phenix Cheese corporation, subsidiary of National Dairy, was said to have stopped sales to outlets which did not maintain prices.

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Aimee Semple McPherson and her daughter, Roberta Semple, met last night in a vain effort to reconcile their differences. Mrs. Minnie (Ma) Kennedy, mother of the evangelist, said today.

Mrs. McPherson presented a typewritten list of terms for settlement of the dispute over management of Angelus temple, said Mrs. Kennedy, and Miss Semple rejected it, leaving in tears. Miss Semple has split with her mother over the powers granted Gilea Knight, newly appointed business manager of the church.
