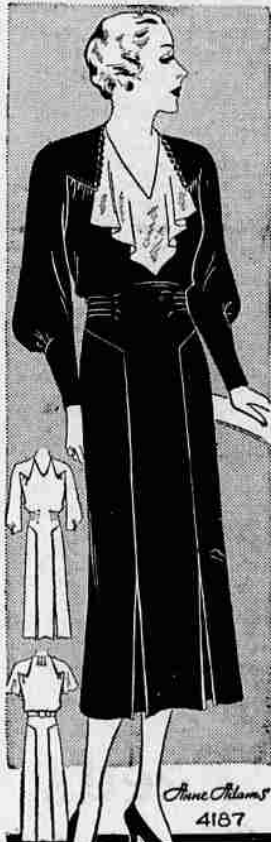
MR. BECKER HONORED ON BIRTHDAY ANNIVERSARY

FAVORITE RECIPES

SAUSAGE
MRS. THOS. W. HATFIELD
Roseburg, Ore.
20 lbs. meat; 7 T salt; 2 T brown sugar; 3 T sage; 3 T pepper; 1 T red pepper; 1 T nutmeg. Mix well.

HEAD CHEESE
MRS. EPPLE SPENCER
Myrtle Creek, Ore.

Clean the head of a hog well. Cut away much of the fat and any other part you would not wish to eat. Boil until the meat comes loose from the bone. Cool and remove all bones. Cut into very small pieces. Salt and pepper to taste. Cook in the broth until the broth is just even with meat or until the broth is quite solid with meat. Put in enamel pan to set. In cool weather this will keep for several days. Serve sliced cold. A lemon garnish is very nice. Sage, garlic, onion juice or spices may be added. I cook pickling spices with headcheese, in a cloth sack and remove sack when done.

PRUNE BREAD

2 c cut prunes; 1 c hot water; 1 T shortening; 2 1/2 c flour; 1 egg; 1/2 c chopped nuts; 1 c sugar; 1 T soda; 1 T salt; 1 T baking powder. Soak for a short time, enough prunes to make 2 cups, cut from pits. Add 1 c hot water and boil 3 min. Add shortening and cool while preparing dry ingredients. Beat egg, add sugar and mix with prunes and dry ingredients. Bake in slow oven 1 1/4 hrs. or longer, until done.

JACKIE'S CHOICE SANDWICH

2 slices crisp bacon
1 very ripe banana
4 slices wholewheat bread
2 tablespoons whipped peanut butter
Cut crisp fried bacon into bits. Mash bananas and mix with bacon. Butter 1 slice bread and spread with peanut butter. Over this spread bacon and banana. Place second slice on top, buttered side up. Toast in sandwich toaster. Served with cup of cream soup is a complete lunch for children.

CHEESE SANDWICH

2 tablespoons butter
1 tablespoon flour
1 cup milk
1/2 lb. cheese
1 small can pimientos
Salt, paprika, mustard
Lettuce leaves
Make a cream sauce of flour, milk and 1 tablespoon butter. Cook until thick and add cheese, gradually. Cut into small pieces and remaining tablespoon butter. Let stand until cold and add finely cut pimientos, salt, mustard and paprika to taste. Spread thickly on slices of bread and place crisp lettuce leaves between the slices.

QUICK SANDWICHES

Put a piece of butter half size of egg in saucepan, heat, break in 3 eggs, add salt and red pepper to taste. Scramble until dry, remove from fire, cool slightly; thin with mayonnaise. Add a little paprika if desired. This will fill 15 to 20 sandwiches. Butter thin slices of bread and add a lettuce leaf.

SANDWICH SPREAD

1 package Philadelphia cream cheese
1 tablespoon orange juice
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon orange rind (very finely grated)
Pinch of salt
Stir until smooth.

SALMON PIE

1 No. 1 can salmon
2 cups thick white sauce
1 1/2 cups peas
2 cups mashed potatoes
2 tablespoons butter
Take bones out of salmon and flake, and add to the hot white sauce. Drain peas and add to salmon mixture. Place in baking dish and spread potatoes over the top. Dot with butter and brown in quick oven.

SALMON ROLL
MRS. J. A. PROHASKA, Roseburg.

Make a rich baking powder biscuit dough, using twice as much shortening as for regular biscuits. Mix one can salmon with 1 cup diced cooked celery, 1 well-beaten egg, 2 hard-boiled eggs cut fine, 1/2 teaspoon scraped onion, 1/4 cup minced sweet pickle and 1/2 teaspoon paprika. Roll dough to 1/2 inch in thickness and spread with salmon mixture. Roll up and bake in quick oven 15 or 20 minutes. Serve with white sauce. Garnish with lemon and parsley.

CHOCOLATE CHIFFON PIE

1 T gelatin; 1/4 c cold water; 1/2 c ground chocolate or 2 squares; 1/2 c boiling water; 4 eggs; 1 c sugar; 1/4 t salt; 1 t vanilla. Soak gelatin in cold water 5 min. Mix the chocolate and boiling water until smooth. Add softened gelatin, dissolving thoroughly. To this mixture add egg yolks, slightly beaten, 1/2 sugar, salt and vanilla. Cool and when mixture begins to thicken fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and the other 1/4 c sugar. Fill baked pie shell and chill. Just before serving spread over pie a thin layer of whipped cream.

VINEGAR PIE

MRS. GEO. W. HOLM, Roseburg.
Mix 3 T flour; 1 1/2 c sugar; add 3 egg yolks, well beaten. Then add 2 c cold water, 2 T strong vinegar, 1 T lemon extract. Cook in double boiler till thick. (This makes 2 small pies.)

England Facing Dangerous Predicament In Effort to Halt Holy Land Strife By Enforcement of Her Martial Law Edict

NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—(AP)—Nineteen years have passed since Field Marshal Allenby stormed Jerusalem, with British and Arab forces, bringing Turkish domination of centuries to an end. Today martial law culminates the sixteen years of Britain's mandate over the Holy Land. Outwardly the World War might still be on there. Troops, some 15,000 of Britain's finest regiments augmented by thousands more arriving daily, with the finest of equipment, hundreds of machine guns, field pieces and squadrons of airplanes, still are striving to make the mandate workable.

They are fighting not only a comparative handful of desperate Arabs, raiding from the barren, rock-strewn hills and the desert country around the Dead sea, but to preserve as well Britain's empire chain through the Near East into Africa.

Overhead hangs the danger of a general uprising of the millions of Moslems of the east, and particularly of the dreaded Bedouins of Transjordan, where money judiciously spread among the chieftains has kept 100,000 of the world's fiercest fighters on the sidelines.

Worse still is the threat to Great Britain of another humiliation in the east to match the loss of Palestine suffered in the failure to stop Italy in Ethiopia.

She may be called before the league of nations at any time for an accounting of the mandate given her 16 years ago. Today the country is in greater disorder than ever before.

Martial law is the new law, to replace the normal state of all inhabitants.

War to the Death
Previous uprisings of the Arabs, growing out of bitterness over the establishment of a Jewish national home in Palestine, over unrestricted immigration and immense

land buying, were put down quickly. But this one, which has gone on 24 weeks, in a fight to the death in surroundings now so bitter that leaders on both sides agree there is no peaceful solution.

This uprising started spontaneously, without leadership. There was a funeral in Jaffa in April, and Arabs claim that shattering remarks from the sidewalks as the cortege passed started a fight. Before the day was over ten Jews and two Arabs had been killed.

The Arabs closed their shops over Palestine, more as protection against what might follow than anything else.
