LOCAL PLANT SHIPS FIRST CAR OF EGGS

For the first time since beginning operations here in November, 1934, the Roseburg branch packing station of the Pacific Poultry Producers association has shipped a full carload of eggs to eastern markets. Heretofore the plant has not had sufficient receipts to make up an entire car, but a considerable increase in production has made the first carload possible and will provide other carload shipments in the future, according to William G. Burnett, manager.

The plant heretofore has shipped Umpqua valley eggs to Eugene, where sufficient cases were added to complete the carload.
During the first eight months of 1936 receipts at the Roseburg station were 42,000 cases more than in 1935. Mr. Burnett reports, showing both an increase in production and a gain in the number of poultrymen shipping through the cooperative organization.

New Dealers, Fearing Publicity, Censoring News, Landon Charges

TOPEKA, Kan., Oct. 6.—(AP)—Gov. Alf M. Landon said today the New Deal was employing a "censorship of the source of news" which he said was "just as bad as the censorship of news" itself.

"Harry Hopkins has shut off the source of news," the presidential nominee added to a press conference in reply to questions concerning the WPA administrator's statement that relief records were open "to anybody who has a legitimate reason to see them."

Landon said he thought WPA cost records and payrolls "is a public business and the information should be made available to any newspaper."

"I view newspaper publicity as a legitimate purpose," the republican candidate said. "All public records, of any kind or description, should be open to the newspapers."

"It doesn't make any difference whether or not it should be during a campaign. Censorship of the source of news is just as bad as censorship of the news."

"That's what we have now," the governor continued in reply to further questions, "censorship of the

NINE IDAHO MINERS DROP TO DEATH IN CAGE

CABLE SNAPS AS MEN ARE BEING LOADED

Victims' Bodies Mutilated in Drop of 900 Feet in Shaft of Property Near Mullan.

MULLAN, Idaho, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Nine miners plummeted 900 feet to their deaths in the Morning mine, a property of the Federal Mining and Smelting company, near here, early today.
The men were just going off shift at 1 a. m., and were being loaded into a cage, or mine elevator. The steel cable snapped as the cage was only partly loaded, survivors said.

Only four of the badly mutilated bodies were identified by noon today. They were:
Andrew Kene, 54, unmarried, a shoveler, Mullan.
Rey Mithelto, 28, unmarried, a miner, Mullan.
Jerry Phelan, 28, married, timberman, Wallace. His widow and four-year old daughter survive.
Cleo Purcell, 28, married, miner, Mullan, widow, two children, six and eight years old.

Positive identification could not be made until after the entire night shift had been checked. The remaining five bodies were crushed beyond recognition, and mine officials refused to give out more names until the shift roster had been checked again.

Jack Jameson, a miner, said the cage door had been opened, and he had started to step inside when the cable snapped, dropping the cage and its human cargo from the 3000-foot level. He said he barely saved himself from plunging after it.

The cage is a three-deck affair. The bottom deck had just been filled with the nine miners, and the elevator was being moved to load the middle deck when the cable snapped, miners said.

A preliminary investigation indicated the cable broke about 1400 feet above the level from which the cage was being loaded. Thus hundreds of pounds of cable crushed through the cage when it stopped at the 2100-foot level after the.

Herbert L. Knott, alias King, recently brought to Roseburg from Redport to serve a 30-day jail term on a charge of variance, will be released by Sheriff Percy Webb to Sheriff R. W. Ware of El Centro, California, it was reported from the sheriff's office today.

Knott is wanted in California on bad check charges and telegrams asking custody of Knott were received from Los Angeles and San Luis Obispo counties as well as from El Centro. Sheriff Ware gets the prisoner by virtue of first claim received. Webb said. Knott is reported by the sheriff to have agreed to waive extradition.

Cabell Against Gas Tax Slash, Fund Diversion

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Henry J. Cabell, chairman of the state highway commission, last night warmly opposed proposals to reduce gasoline taxes and to divert revenue to other purposes than the maintenance and development of the highway system.

Cabell addressed a "highway banquet" gathering of California and Oregon state officials and delegates to the Shasta-Cascade-Wonderland association convention in session here.

Cabell said he believed a public understanding of the effects of reducing or transferring gasoline taxes money would bring general revolt against the proposals, which he claimed would be "a disaster to the whole state highway program," principally because of loss of federal aid.

On the matter of reallocating the revenue so that counties and cities would receive a larger percentage, the commission chairman said he thought the most reasonable view was that gasoline taxes should support general purpose roads while farm or residential "service" roads should be financed through property taxes.

REGISTRATION IN DOUGLAS INCREASES

Registration of Douglas county voters for the forthcoming general election in November shows a marked increase over former years, according to County Clerk Roy Agee. With an estimated 200 or more registrations yet expected from registrars in rural districts, the clerk's office has a total of 14,156 voters listed, of which number 7,729 are republicans and 4,719 are democrats.

More than 100 additional registrations were in the reports received by mail today from community registrars.

DEATH CAR DRIVER BREAKS SILENCE

MEDFORD, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Jackson county authorities said Lester Messal, 28, of Lake creek, admitted he was involved in the traffic death of Everett Thompson, 55, of Talent, on the Pacific highway last September 13.

Messal told police the victim stepped in front of his car. He said both he and Thompson apparently were blinded by oncoming headlights.

The arrested man, police related, said he failed to report after the accident because his driver's license had been revoked on a reckless driving charge.

The district attorney announced the case would be presented to the grand jury.

TRESTLE GAP TO BE FILLED UP BY S. P. CO.

Right of Way to Former City Dump Site Granted by Council; Hazards of Fire Cited.

The railroad trestle north of town, near the old city dump grounds, will be replaced by a culvert and rock and earth fill, the city council was informed at its regular meeting last night by the Southern Pacific company. As a part of the fill will extend over onto city-owned property, the company requested right of way, and the desired authority for use of the land was granted by the council.

In the absence of Mayor C. W. Clark, last night's meeting of the council was conducted by A. J. Young, president.

Only routine matters were acted upon.

Fire Hazards Cited

There was considerable discussion regarding fire hazards, the council's interest having been revived by the recent disaster at Bandon.

Fire Chief Iolo Stephens reported that accumulations of rubbish, dry grass, together with ruins of old sheds, etc., created a considerable hazard east of town between East Lane and Douglas streets, and recommended that a fire break be built before another fire season. He also reported presence of a good deal of brush and rubbish on many city lots and stated that some action should be taken by the council to allow rubbish fires within the city only when some sort of an incinerator is provided to prevent flying sparks and embers. The matter was left for further consideration, aside from instructions given the police department to order rubbish piles removed from property with.

FORESTS REOPENED TO SPORT SEEKERS

Many hunters and fishermen resumed their sport today, following the lifting of the forest ban, effective for the past week. By proclamation of Governor Charles H. Martin late yesterday, the forest areas, closed because of serious fire danger, were reopened to entry, with the exception of areas in Lincoln, Coos and Curry counties, where the ban remains because of the presence of a large number of fire fighters.

While entry into national forest areas is again permitted, forest regulations still prevail, according to a warning issued this morning from the local headquarters of the Umpqua National forest. The national forest service will still require campfire permits and will enforce the no smoking while traveling rule and will require persons entering the forest to carry an axe, water bucket and shovel, it was announced. Ordinarily these regulations are lifted September 1, but because of the extreme hazard this season, the rules are to be continued in force until October 15 and later if necessary, it was reported.

FURTHER U. S. AID FOR BONDON SOUGHT

SALEM, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Governor Martin pulled state forces out of the Bandon fire area today and dispatched Brigadier General Thomas E. Riley from that section to Washington, D. C., where he will seek further federal aid in expediting the program for temporary reconstruction.

Riley will leave by plane for the national capital tonight where, with the concurrence of E. J. Griffith, Oregon WPA administrator, he will present the picture to relief authorities and to President Roosevelt "if necessary," Governor Martin said.

PAYS \$25 FINE FOR DISORDERLY ACTS

Entering a plea of guilty in the justice court to a charge of disorderly conduct, Kenneth Clinger of Roseburg, was fined \$25 by Judge R. W. Marsters late yesterday.

Clinger was arrested Saturday night and was reported at the sheriff's office to have broken down window panes and to have destroyed a mattress while confined in the county jail.

TRANSIENT ADMITS AUTOMOBILE THEFT

Steve McGinnis, transient, arrested Sunday on a charge of car theft, entered a plea of guilty in the circuit court late yesterday. Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly postponed the passing of sentence until late today.

MUNICH, Germany, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Premier Julius Goemboes of Hungary died today in a sanatorium at Nymphenburg after a long illness. He was 50 years old.

REBELS MASS 150,000 FOR FINAL ONSET

Decisive Attack on Madrid Impending; Hundreds of Upper Class Slain in Capital.

BURGOS, Spain, Oct. 6.—(Insurgent Press)—Inspired by reports of fresh victories in the bloody civil war against socialists, marshaled 150,000 disciplined troops today for a march on Madrid.

The decisive assault on the capital, fascist headquarters announced, would be led by General Francisco Franco, head of the insurgent provisional government and designed "chief of the Spanish army."

The drive was set to begin as soon as present operations to tighten the insurgent lines and effect junctions of marching columns were completed.

Fascist headquarters announced these developments on the 80th day of the devastating conflict.

Advance of insurgent troops to within six miles of the government-controlled railroad between Madrid and Valencia near Terrior de la Calzada.

Capture of 300 socialist trucks.

Despite statewide activities of police officers, no arrests have yet been made in connection with three safe robberies at Redport early Monday or the slugging and robbery yesterday of Frank Hathaway, Tye district farmer, by a group of three women and a man.

The safe robbers at Redport are said to have secured between \$1,200 and \$1,500 by blowing safes of the Rainbow confectionery and Safeway store, as well as rifling the open safe at the Burton Drug store.

The party sought for the assault and robbery of Hathaway has apparently gone into hiding, officers report, as police guards were placed over all roads leading out of the district soon after the report of the robbery was received.

2 HUNTERS SHOT IN MISHAPS; ONE DIES

BURNS, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Southern Oregon chalked up its first hunting fatality of the season with the death of Arthur Jones, 18, Burns. The youth died in a hospital here last night a few hours after a bullet from his accidentally discharged gun shattered his right shoulder.

Jones, a mill employee, was hunting with a group of friends on Epigant creek, 45 miles northwest of Burns.

KLAMATH FALLS, Oct. 6.—Another casualty of the hunting season was recorded here when Wesley Hill, 35, of Modoc Point was shot in the shoulder. The mishap took place near Glene.

Hill was struck when the trigger of his companion's shotgun was released by the handle of an automobile door.

WOMAN BURNED IN HOUSEBOAT BLAZE

THE DALLES, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Physicians today held out little hope for the recovery of Mrs. Frank Loonan, 29, trapped in a burning houseboat last night. The woman was pulled from the flames by Mrs. Lloyd Gorton shortly before the craft was totally destroyed.

Fire investigators said they believed Mrs. Loonan fell asleep while smoking a cigarette.

FLIER'S GOAL STOCKHOLM IN EASTERLY TRY

Baroness Who Expected to Accompany Swedish Air Pilot Meets With Disappointment.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Kurt Bjorkvall, 31-year old Swedish flier, hopped off from Floyd Bennett field today on the first leg of a projected trip to Stockholm.

Bjorkvall, who rejected the proposal that Baroness Eva von Hiltz-en-Finecke accompany him, left the ground at 7:35 a. m.

He planned to fly to St. Johns, Newfoundland, where he will refuel for the Atlantic hop to Ireland and thence to Sweden.

"I hope I make the flight," was all the aviator said as he entered his plane.

The weather bureau said excellent weather conditions prevailed to Newfoundland with mild crosswinds, but that off Cape Race a cold westerly wind was blowing, sending the thermometer down to freezing.

The baroness, who had hoped to make the ocean journey, waved goodbye but expressed disappointment.

Bjorkvall's monoplane has a wireless receiving set but no sending apparatus. He planned to obtain weather reports at regular periods.

Has Big Food Supply
The plane carried 742 gallons of gasoline. It was stocked with roast chicken, bananas, tomato juice, a gallon jug of coffee and a gallon of water.

Bjorkvall also took emergency rations—tins of biscuits and food in capsules—sufficient to last 30 days. A life preserver was his only safety equipment in the event he should be forced down at sea.

Bjorkvall explained a Swedish newspaper had withdrawn its backing of the venture, and he had bought the plane.

"The flight is my own now," he said. "Therefore, I cannot take the

"TIGER" BOY GIVES WAY TO WEEPING

BELLINGHAM, Wash., Oct. 6.—(AP)—A seven-year-old "tiger boy" who police said, "seemed pleased" with his attempt to kill a baby with an iron bar, cried when he learned he was to be taken from his parents today.

It was the first emotional breakdown of the second-grade school boy who has shown no remorse for his almost fatal assault upon 22-month-old Roland Smith.

When the boy, whose name was withheld, learned juvenile authorities were taking him to the Washington state children's home at Seattle for temporary observation, he cried and clung to his parents as he said a final goodbye.

The victim of the "tiger boy's" attack was found in an alley Friday. His skull was fractured.

PORTLAND RIOTERS LOSE ON APPEAL

SALEM, Oct. 6.—(AP)—The four defendants convicted of contempt of court for refusal to testify in the riot charges against Art Shearer, an outgrowth of the Portland longshoremen's strike in August 1934, must serve their six months' sentences, the state supreme court ruled today in an oral denial for rehearing of the case.

Paul Jennings, C. N. Abbott, Arthur Rust and Karl Tigert refused to answer questions as witnesses in the Shearer trial holding that their testimony might incriminate themselves. The supreme court upheld their convictions in a recent 5 to 2 opinion. Shearer was being tried for participation in a riot in which James Conner was killed.

COERCION CHARGED TO WPA CHIEFTAINS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 6.—(AP)—Submitting copies of three affidavits alleging political coercion by WPA supervisors in Pennsylvania, the republican national committee today demanded open hearings by the senate campaign funds investigating committee.

"If the new deal is not guilty," said a memorandum sent to Chairman Loneragan (D., Conn.), "clear it in open hearings. If it is guilty, use the weight of the United States senate to suppress political disloyalty. Use it before the votes are stolen."

William Harl, political commentator for the republican committee, read the affidavits over the radio last night. It was said he would continue to supply the senate investigators each night this week "with similar evidence that the new deal in Pennsylvania is an abominable racket preying upon the poor and exploiting the unfortunate."

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
