Confused Trade Statistics.

SOUTH AFRICA, where the

world's finest diamonds are

mined and whence wool of super-

ior quality is exported, is boycot-

ting American goods and the boy-

cott has assumed such prodigious

proportions that the National For-

eign Trade association has been

moved to take action. The agita-

tion against the United States, based

on our failure to buy more

South African goods, is even be-

ing fomented by mass meetings.

Orders for mining equipment, in-

dustrial machinery and consumer

goods have been diverted from

American to competing European

dealers.

To offset the condition it may

be that a trade mission may be

sent to South Africa. As a mat-

ter of fact South African diamonds,

of which the United States is the

largest purchaser, shipped first to

Holland and then imported here,

appear in the statistics of trade as

exports from Holland. A similar

condition exists in wool, which is

sent to London and then imported

into the United States. This is

one of the anomalies of trade sta-

tistics. When taken as a norm of

accounting in buying and selling

they do not always reveal the ba-

lance upon which the facts are laid.

Under such conditions they may

act as an actual deterrent to the

barter upon which trade transac-

tions rest. Unless some means can

be found by way of explanation in

such cases there is almost certain

to be an unfavorable reaction.

Dead Languages.

WILL DURANT, whose claims

upon standing as a scholar are

by no means unimportant, urged

recently that dead languages be

buried. Those elements of the

youth of the land who are taking

up anew the battle with Greek and

Latin will concur in his opinion. It

is doubtful, however, if they ap-

proach the issue with an open

mind. There are others, entirely

disinterested, who share his

thought in the matter.

A knowledge of the languages,

they insist, is no more essential

to an appreciation of Greek and

Latin literature than a knowledge

of German to read Goethe, or Rus-

sian to read Dostoevsky, or Ital-

ian to read Moliere, or French to

read Camoens. They are even so

bold as to say that the teaching

of Greek and Latin is a racket

maintained by the teachers ther-

of.

Their conclusions, however, are

as harsh as they are unsound. If

a knowledge of the origins of

languages is important to sound

learning, and it is conceded to be

by most scholars, Greek and Lat-

in, from which so much of our

modern language is derived, can-

not be dismissed lightly as being

of little consequence. There may

be basis for criticism in the ex-

tensive teaching of the languages,

which might be taught more ad-

vantageously to pupils especially

qualified intellectually, but their

importance to culture does not

diminish with the years.
